TIMELY RECIPES FOR HOUSEWIFE

Fudge
Two cups sugar.
Two squares unsweetened chocolate.
Three-quarters cup milk.
One tablespoon butter.
One teaspoon vanilla.
Boil sugar, milk and chocolate until the syrup forms a soft ball when dropped in cold water (238 degrees Fahrenheit). Take from the fire, add butter; set aside to cool, then add vanilla and stir mixture until it begins to thicken. Pour on once into a buttered plate and cut into squares. Chopped nuts may be added.

Requested Recipe
Celery dressing is to be used for veal or poultry: Three cups dry bread crumbs; salt and pepper to taste; teaspoon ground sage; one tablespoon onion juice; two cups chopped celery; three-quarters cup melted butter or substitute. Mix in order named.

Fruit Cake
One pound butter, one pound white sugar, one pound flour, two pounds raisins, two and one-half pounds currants, one-half pound lemon peel, one-half pound citron, two tablespoons cinnamon, two tablespoons cloves, eleven eggs, two grated oranges, one-half teaspoon soda, half pint brandy, one pound walnuts. Prepare all the day before. Dust raisins with flour and pick over walnuts; chop fine or put through grinder. If peel is hard, steam till soft, then chop. Line your dish with greased paper, and bake four and one-half or five hours in a slow oven. The baking is the main thing.

FRUIT CAKE
One-half cup butter.
One cup brown sugar.
Three eggs.
One cup flour.
One-fourth cup ground chocolate.
One teaspoon each cinnamon and nutmeg.
One-half each cloves and allspice.
One-half cup molasses.
One teaspoon vanilla.
Two cups seeded raisins.
Two cups seedless raisins.
One-half cup shredded citron.
One-fourth teaspoon soda dissolved in teaspoon cold water.
Mix fruit well; sift flour, spices and chocolate; cream butter until wax; add sugar, gradually beating well; add beaten egg yolks, molasses, vanilla and flour, mixing well. Combine fruit and cake batter; when well mixed, fold in the stiffly beaten white of eggs and the dissolved soda. Line a baking pan with greased paper, pour in the cake batter and bake in a very slow oven about two hours.

MINCE MEAT
Six cups cooked beef, chopped fine, three cups suet, chopped fine; twelve cups apples, peeled, cored and chopped; two cups sugar, two cups New Orleans molasses; two pounds seedless raisins; one-half pound citron, shaved fine; three cups boiled rice; one tablespoon each ground cinnamon and nutmeg; one teaspoon each cloves and allspice; one tablespoon vanilla. Two cups seeded raisins. Two cups seedless raisins. One-half cup shredded citron. One-fourth teaspoon soda dissolved in teaspoon cold water.
Mix fruit well; sift flour, spices and chocolate; cream butter until wax; add sugar, gradually beating well; add beaten egg yolks, molasses, vanilla and flour, mixing well. Combine fruit and cake batter; when well mixed, fold in the stiffly beaten white of eggs and the dissolved soda. Line a baking pan with greased paper, pour in the cake batter and bake in a very slow oven about two hours.

PLUM PUDDING
One cup soft bread crumbs, one and one-half cups chopped suet, two cups chopped apples, one cup brown sugar, two cups flour, one teaspoon each cinnamon, nutmeg, and salt, one cup seeded raisins, one-half cup shredded citron, one-half cup finely chopped walnuts, one-half cup molasses, three eggs beaten separately.
Sift flour, spices and soda. Add bread crumbs, fruit, nuts, sugar, suet, apples, molasses, beaten yolks and mix thoroughly. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg white. Butter a pudding mold thoroughly. Drainage generously with sugar and pour in the batter, filling mold only two-thirds full. Cover tightly and set on rack in a kettle of boiling water, having water about two-thirds of the mold. Cover kettle closely and keep water boiling constantly until pudding is cooked. If made in one pudding it will take about three hours. Smaller ones in proportion. May be made several days before required.

STUDENTS ACCEPT EVOLUTION THEORY

University students generally accept the theory of evolution as an explanation of the universe and of man according to the report received by Rev. Frank Fay Eddy of the Unitarian church, to a series of questions he has been circulating recently among the students. The first of the questions was "Do you accept the theory of evolution as the explanation of the universe and of man?" Without exception thus far the reply has been in the affirmative, Mr. Eddy says. The other questions were: "What is your idea about God?" "How do you estimate Jesus?" "Do you think of yourself as a sinner? If so what do you are going to do about it?" "From what influences, mental, moral or spiritual do you get a sense of direction in life?" In other words, by what rules are you willing to play the game in life?" Mr. Eddy is using the replies received as a basis for a series of sermons. He states that the aim was to get at the psychology of the university students and to discover just how far they were prepared to accept the philosophical consequences of evolution.

GERMANY TAKING OVER MARKETS OF EASTERN EUROPE

Paris, Jan. 14.—Germany has started a commercial colonization of Eastern Europe and is on the way to success. One of the main reasons for such success is the difference between the comparatively high rates of exchange among the group of Anglo-Saxon and Latin states and the other group of Germanic and Slavic states whose money is very depreciated. This difference is so big that it has created a kind of broad deep gulf that neither one on both sides can cross any more. Frequently the last few days on the Paris exchange market, the Austrian and the Hungarian crown, the Polish mark, the Serbian and the Bulgarian dinar, have not been quoted at all, while the Czechoslovak crown was only worth little more than one cent and the Finnish mark one and a half cent, which shows in fact the Western Powers no longer possess means of exchange with those countries. But Germany has established the transition, launched the necessary bridge between the two banks of the unbridgeable stream, and thanks to the fall of her exchange, the German mark has become in the later countries an easily negotiable money. This is how Germany is capturing the markets in Eastern Europe where she offers to her old pre-war clients all the goods they need, at a fairly high price for them, but which they can still afford to pay. Knowing the perfect organization of the German trade, there is no doubt Germany can, within a short time, draw exclusive profit from most of the states around her, including the Balkans, Poland and Hungary. Also, in exchange for the manufactured products which she will sell, one must not think Germany will retain the depreciated money of her neighbors. She will employ it on the spot to buy Roumanian wheat, Galician oil, timber and minerals in Poland. And with this raw material, after having put aside, at a cheap price, the quantities necessary to the national consumption, she won't meet difficulties to re-export the surplus, being the only power in Eastern Europe that has a merchant marine. Thus, Germany will be doing arbitrage business accumulating the normal benefit made with the trade of merchandise and the profit resulting from the money traffic. Owing to the powerful banking organization of Germany, the conclusion is that she may become the ruler of the money market in those countries where she can install the domination of her own money and her trade as well. The day Russia reopens commercial relations with Europe Germany would establish on Eastern Europe the hegemony that immediately after the war the pangermanists said she must get in the nearest possible future. It is generally believed here that it is then one more reason for the allied nations to avoid a German monetary bankruptcy, in order to reinforce the indispensable balance between the winner, who is menaced by his own wealth, and the loser, drawing profit out of his very ruin.

IRVING DEMANDS ELECTRIC LIGHTS

The Irving Promotion club, in a communication addressed to the Eugene Chamber of Commerce and signed by E. W. Zumwalt, William Klusman and J. E. Shelton, ask for assistance in securing electric lights for their town and surrounding community. The securing of this convenience, it is claimed, would result in the large farms around Irving being cut up into acreage tracts and become the site of many suburban homes. Efforts by the club to secure from the Eugene water board the desired accommodation have proven fruitless. The Chamber of Commerce is expected to help in the enterprise. The water board states this has no surplus electricity with which to meet the Irving demand. The Irving club claim that since the city monopoly of the electrical city purchasing the Oregon Power plant, they should give the same that private corporations extend. It gives way to some private enterprise which would supply the "juice." A campaign to enlarge electrical plant is suggested.
