## Chinese Art Collection Offered "U"

Much interest and appreciation is being shown as a result of the recent gift to the University of an art collection by Mrs. Murray Warner of Eugene. Mrs. Warner had offered her entire collection of art objects to the University as a part of a possible art museum on the campus and as soon as cases are obtained to hold the collection will be placed in the club rooms of the Woman's building.

The collection contains many old and rare antiques which Mrs. Warner collected on her travels in Europe and the Orient, and many of them could not be duplicated today. There are 25 Chinese Mandarin coats and skirts, all embroidered and finely worn and among them a coat which formerly belonged to a Chinese emperor. Over 250 Japanese prints of inestimable value form another part of the collection. Many of these are very old and rare and are done by the best Japanese artist.

There are several large tapestries and wall hangings and great numbers of embroideries and quilts. One group of these is made up of twelve separate panels the design of each of them representing a month of the year.

The collection contains also a number of rare pieces of china and porcelain, including a pair of vases, a pair of porcelain screen and an antique bronze temple bell.

Another group comprises old war implements, knives, helmets, swords and a set of Japanese armor. Too numerous to describe are many other objects of great value from China, Japan, India, France, Italy, Turkey and Switzerland.

The Warner collection is invaluable and has no equal in the entire country, according to Dean Lawrence, director of the school of architecture. "It is especially fitting," stated Dean Lawrence, "that our art school on the coast should have such a fine Oriental collection for its through in the art of the Orient reaches the United States."

Miss Maude Kerns, head of the normal arts department of the school believes that this collection will be of great value to the department in the study of color and design, especially from the standpoint of color and design. It will serve the students in the department as an illustration of the best in art, according to Miss Kerns.
