Reedport Shipping Doors—A carload of garage doors valued at \$4500 is being shipped over the Southwestern Pacific to Chicago by the Reedport Sash and Door factory. The Reedport factory has resumed operations and is now manufacturing two carloads of sash and door stock weekly.

POSTOFFICE MAY BE FURTHER ALTERED

Alterations costing \$2,000 to \$3,000 in the Eugene postoffice building will be recommended by J. S. Roberts, superintendent of buildings, treasury department, San Francisco, who was in the city yesterday inspecting the changes now being made in the building, which are pending completion.

The changes contemplated include putting in a spiral stairway, moving doors and other minor alterations. The changes being made now involve an expense of \$5,000, the amount of Contractor Biberbeck's bid, which was considerably lower than his competitors, one of whom bid \$20,000 on the job. The work is under the supervision of J. H. Sutton, government building inspector. The moving of a single stone in the foundation and supplying it with basement window is costing \$800.
