IRISH ANXIOUS FOR GREATER FREEDOM

Paris, Jan. 24.—A world wide association to work for greater freedom for Ireland was projected at the Irish race congress here today.

A committee met here in secret session to form such an organization which would represent millions of Irishmen throughout the world.

Members of the committee include: Eamon de Valera, former president of the Irish republic; Art O'Brien, Professor Hayes and Jos. Castellino of Cincinnati, representing the United States.

"The object is to federate Irish societies with a view to working for greater freedom of Ireland," O'Brien told the United Press.

De Valera brought forward the proposals for the formation of the association last yesterday when he stirred up the race congress by advocating a world wide organization to popularize throughout the world Irish history, dancing, music and games. In this way it is hoped the traditions of the Irish race can be known and the Irish people appreciated.

James Fickett to Manage Mammoth Eccles Company

Ogden, Utah, Jan. 24.—Announcement that on February 1, James E. Fickett, vice-president of the Bank of Italy, San Francisco, will become manager of the David Eccles company with headquarters here, has been made.

Royal Eccles, acting manager of the company for the last year, made the announcement. The company is composed of heirs of the late David Eccles and owns lumber and railroad interests in Oregon, sugar holdings in Utah and Idaho, and street and interurban railroads in Ogden and vicinity.

LUMBER CONCESSION WON

San Francisco, Jan. 24.—The Southern Pacific company announced Monday what it called an important concession to the California lumber industry in arranging to permit the forwarding of mixed carloads of shingles and lumber from California to eastern points.

The rate will be based on the carload rate for each and on actual weight subject to a minimum carload weight of 30,000 pounds. This is expected to meet the demand of eastern buyers for the inclusion of small lots of shingles with their carload lumber purchases.

COUNTY JUDGE DEAD

Toledo, Ore., Jan. 24.—John Fogarty, county judge of Lincoln county, died suddenly Monday evening shortly after returning from his office. He complained of a pain in his side and five minutes later was dead. Heart disease is attributed as the cause. He was 70 years of age and was serving his second term as county judge. He was elected on the democratic ticket. Previously to serving as judge he had been a member of the board of county commissioners for one term.

TO PROBE BOND SALE

Seattle, Jan. 24.—Sweeping investigation of the \$2,500,000 Skagit bonds sale in which the city is alleged to have been robbed of nearly \$200,000 was ordered by the city council yesterday afternoon. February 17 was fixed as the date for the hearing.

As the World Wags

WHAT would you call the greatest invention of the last century—a century filled with marvels? Many think it is simply a vacuum tube in which hangs a fine wire filament with a wire spiral around it and at one side of the spiral a thin piece of metal curved into a cylinder open on one side. It is the vacuum tube amplifier. By its aid man takes another step toward the control and use of the electrical energy of the universe. By its aid we catch a faint vibration out of the ether and multiply it by passing it through this simple looking tube.

SEVERAL BLAINS worked upon the vacuum tube with a fine tungsten wire filament surrounded by a plate, forming two electrodes within the tube. Later Dr. Forest added the spiral which had the effect of amplifying the current, which passed from the filament to the plate.

WE OMBAS, by the aid of this invention, the electrons, the invisible minute and possibly fine units of matter as they pass through the vacuum tube in an electric current and pour into that current somehow an added energy which makes it possible to receive the almost inaudible ether wave which carries a sound for instance, and so increases it that it becomes audible to the duller mechanism of our ears.

HENCE the explanation of how President Harding's voice was carried to the ears of the multitudes which gathered about the platform under which was concealed an ingenious arrangement of these vacuum tubes electrically connected. By means of this electrical marvel it is possible to speak from New York to San Francisco and soon a man will be able to speak a message into a transmitter and put the receiver to his ear and hear his voice after it has been carried completely around the globe upon other waves which have been caught up and amplified by passing the electrified vibrations through a series of these amplifiers.

SUGGESTIONS from this marvelous invention are offered by scientists. One is that we may yet actually hear plants grow. And Edison probably had the use of this amplifier in mind when he suggested that if we are to actually prove that individuals exist in the ether we call the spirit world, the way to proceed is by making a mechanism which will respond to inconceivably slight vibrations of energy. If an individual entity on the "other side" can exert the slightest energy, it is conceivable that by trying we can invent a receiver which will permit hearing the message carried on the ether wave. Such is his thought. The scientific imagination indeed vaults the farthest in the modern world. The Deagan case of the poet is a staid legend beside the nimble electron of the scientist.

Song Makes American River World Famous

Yet Total Length of Stream Is Only 200 Miles

Can you name the best known river in the world? Almost certainly you cannot. Guesses on the point would probably be almost as various as the number of important commercial rivers on the globe. But they would all be wrong.

Nor can the much chronicled Revere-River of Doubt or the Blue Danube of waltz fame claim the honor.

The best known river in the world is exactly 200 miles long. It has no commercial value whatever and its esthetic qualities are invisible to the naked eye.

Yet the Suwanee River, running in a zig-zag, go-as-you-please course through the states of Georgia and Florida is known to every race and language. Of course it's always misspelled. Its second claim to distinction in fact, is that it is probably the most misspelled stream of water in the world, bar not even the Yangtze or the Mississippi.

Suwanee Misspelled

And by a singular chance the man who made it famous also got it misspelled. He was Stephen Foster, composer of "Old Folks at Home" in which the Suwanee River has been immortalized. Foster needed a two syllable river for the rhythm of his song and a study of the map revealed Suwanee, only it had too many syllables.

"Easy," said he and cut out the "u" making the "Swanee" spelling that has been sung everywhere the human race is found. For whatever the language translation, "Swanee" remains the same.

Of course some of those who sing the song never bother to spell the river anyway. For the savage tribes of Tibet and Timbuctu are as fond of this American contribution as their more civilized brothers. Missionaries have found the song seems to fill a savage need and they use it extensively in their work.

New Walts

In addition to its primary service the Suwanee River has served as the theme for scores of song writers since Stephen Foster, including H. Pitman Clarke whose "Swanee River Moon" is a rippling waltz of the same simple sweetness of the original "Swanee," as:

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URGES EARLY PLACING OF SEED CORN ORDERS

There is a scarcity of good seed corn in the county and farmers who are contemplating planting corn would do well to place their orders with the county agent's office at once, says Ira P. Whitney, county agent. Also, farmers who have seed corn to sell should notify him and have their seeds tested so an exchange can be made, he recommends.

Because of the early freeze last fall much of the seed corn was damaged so that a large percentage of it will not germinate, says Mr. Whitney, who advises planting only the best seeds. The seed samples will be tested free. There is not only a scarcity of seed corn in the county but many of the farmers are shipping it out to a ready market and if local buyers don't get busy now will be left, says Mr. Whitney. E. H. Ross of Santa Clara recently sent a 400 pound shipment of seed corn to Washington county, where there is also a scarcity.

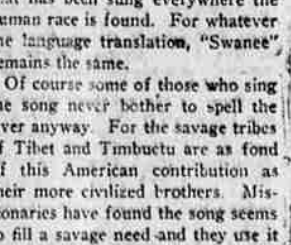
The Grangers' Eugene warehouse shipped in 250 tons of corn last year from the middle west. While Mr. Whitney does not recommend attempting to make this a corn growing section, on account of the climatic conditions, he says that it is necessary to raise a great amount of corn especially for ensilage. Barley is a good substitute for corn in feeding both cattle and hogs. Mr. Whitney has recently advocated it in his feeding schools and Professor Marius of O. A. C. recommended it at the farmers' week meeting here. There are now numerous calls for barley for seed.

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Hancock barley is recommended by the Oregon Agricultural college as the best variety for this section.

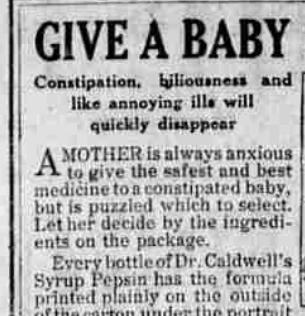
