WILL VOTE IN MAY ON BUYING FAIR GROUNDS

At a meeting of the county fair board yesterday afternoon it was decided to initiate a petition to vote on the question of buying the fair grounds, upon which the county holds an option of \$250,000. The vote is to be taken at the May primaries, which is the only chance the taxpayers of Lane county will have to express themselves upon this question before the option expires in December, 1922, without holding an expensive special election.

The following committee was appointed to formulate and circulate the petition: George W. Taylor, president fair board; W. A. Ayres, secretary; W. C. Yarnall, E. A. McCormick, and A. R. Gray.

The fair grounds comprise 68 acres, two-thirds of which lies within the city limits. It is owned by the Agricultural Society, which is composed largely of city men. The option was obtained three years ago, in order to justify the fair board in putting up buildings and otherwise improving the grounds. These improvements are conservatively estimated to be worth \$10,000 and would be a total loss to the county in case the option was permitted to lapse. The price is considered very cheap, being only \$292 per acre for land in a neighborhood where lots sell as high as \$500 each.

The various branches of Lane county have nearly all passed resolutions endorsing the proposed purchase and the sentiment in favor of the move appears to be quite general.

START WORK TO RID COAST OF NEMATODE

A survey of the whole coast country to determine to what extent the nematode has attacked strawberries, cherries and other legume plants will be made at once by representatives of the federal board of horticulture and experts from O. A. C.

This action was decided upon by a meeting of Lane county officials, members of the O. A. C. faculty and horticultural experts in the county house yesterday.

After the survey steps will be taken to eradicate the pest in sections where it is discovered to exist. Printed pamphlets will be distributed among the people of the coast country telling how to rid their lands of this dangerous pest.

MOTHER IN LAW HELD ON ASSAULT CHARGE

Los Angeles, Jan. 25.—A blood soaked shirt waist, a bloodstained handkerchief and two bullets form the first three links in the chain of evidence which police are endeavoring to draw around Mrs. Mattie Hannon, mother-in-law of Paul Kramer, movie director who was mysteriously shot from ambush in Hollywood Monday night.

Mrs. Hannon was held by the police today with an entry specifying she is held on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon opposite her name on the jail register.

Winifred Kramer, pretty 20 year old wife of the wounded man, has been questioned by the police. She declares she knows who shot her husband but cannot prove it. Kramer buyers near death at the county hospital with four bullet wounds in his head and another in his hand. At the hospital, while his wounds were being dressed, he accused his mother-in-law with the shooting, police said.

On the night of the shooting, persons in the neighborhood of 1600 Micheltorena avenue heard the five shots. Fearing to investigate immediately it was some time before Kramer was found in a pool of blood on the driveway of his home.

His truck stood near, covered with blood. Police will analyze the blood found on the mother-in-law's shirt waist and handkerchief in an effort to ascertain whether it is Kramer's own blood.
