BASS IS BOUND OVER ON BURGLARY CHARGE

On a charge of burglary of a Long Tim duck club cabin, James Bass, of Elmira, arrested yesterday afternoon, was bound over to the grand jury on bonds of \$2000 by Judge Jesse G. Wells in justice court. Bass furnished the bail and was released from custody. Love, rivalry, romance and mystery are said to surround the case.

Bass is charged with breaking into the duck club cabin on the Gibson place, of which District Attorney Clyde N. Johnston is a member, and carrying away a quantity of blankets. The cabin was broken into last week and members found a letter on the floor, evidently dropped by the burglar, addressed to Ed Fuqua. Fuqua was examined by the officers and disclaimed any knowledge of the affair but said that he had an enemy in Bass, whom he believed had attempted to assault him with a club in the dark.

A few days ago part of the stolen blankets were found hidden in Fuqua's brother-in-law's grainery and suspicion turned to Bass. It is said that Bass had become jealous of young Fuqua while working on the brother-in-law's place because the young man was going with a girl he had become enamored with.

Bass waived the examination today and the matter will be left to the grand jury to solve the mystery.

COURT DESIGNATES MARKET HIGHWAYS

Designating certain county highways as market routes, resolutions to the state highway commission, requesting aid from the market road fund as provided by law, have been passed by the Lane county court and filed with the county clerk. The resolutions state that the county has voted 145 miles for market road funds with which to match the one-half state market road money. The county budget carries \$57,148.71 for market road purposes and it is expected that this amount will be matched.

Roads and projects designated in the resolution are: McVey Point overhead crossing, Cottage Grove north, Latham bridge, emergency, Coburg north, Jasper-Natron, Noti road, Mapleton east, city limits at South Willamette street, Cross state route, Fall Creek road, Alsea-Coville roads and bridges on market roads.
