However, Dr. John Boward, head of the health service, announced that "the danger of the epidemic is past; the students, house mothers and others continue to cooperate as they have. They have done a good job and have made things better for us and better on the campus."

Seattle, Jan. 27.—"Honest Dan" Landon has entered the race for mayor. Landon, who is a well-known lawyer and an even better known member of the state legislature, announced his candidacy today. The entrance of "Honest Dan" into the campaign had the effect of a bombshell in the camps of other prospective candidates.

BANDITS SHOOT PRIEST

Chicago, Jan. 27.—Rev. Frank Chodaniewicz, 50, priest of the Saint Florence church here, was shot in the leg early this morning when he surprised bandits in the church.

The bandits fled after the shooting without any loot.

ASK U. OF O. CHAIR IN CHINESE COLLEGE

Shall the University of Oregon establish and maintain a chair of journalism or some other subject in the Canton, China, Christian College?

This question is being considered by a committee consisting of various heads of departments and student associations. While no definite action has been taken, the proposition is being considered favorably and an attempt will be made at a meeting, to be held soon, to work out a definite plan for putting over the project.

Chairs are being supported in the college named by nine American educational institutions, including the Universities of Washington and Pennsylvania, Wellesley, the Teachers' College of Columbia University and the Kansas Agricultural College. The prospective teacher from the University of Oregon would be known as the "Oregon Professor" and would act as a commercial consul for this state, an arrangement which is considered very advantageous to all concerned.

Edmunds Lectures at Villard
Dr. C. K. Edmunds, president of Canton Christian College, gave his lecture, "Thirty-five Miles Through China," at Villard hall last evening to a large and appreciative audience. Stenographic pictures illustrated the lecture.

Many were taken far into the interior of Kwang-tung province and showed scenes which few western people have looked upon.

Over 300 of Dr. Edmunds' Chinese photos have been acquired by the National Geographic Magazine.

"The Switzerland of China," is the way the speaker referred to the mountainous section in the western portion of the Kwangtung Kingdom. Especially interesting views were shown illustrating how the Chinese would like to keep on the ridges. The illustrious floods which often sweep over the Yellow river valley are caused largely by the denuding of the mountains and foothills of their natural growth of forest, explained Dr. Edmunds, who showed the ultimate effects of not putting into practice intelligent conservation methods.

Is in Portland Today
Dr. Edmunds left last night for Portland, where he speaks at Reed College tonight, after delivering various addresses in that city during the day. He spoke twice in Eugene yesterday.

OPPOSITION AROUSED TO INCOME TAX PLAN

Portland, Ore., Jan. 27.—Real property, using the legal definition of the term, paid 85.2 per cent of the tax roll of 1921, according to a compilation submitted to the tax investigation committee. The remaining 14.8 per cent was from personal property. In 1920 the percentage of real property was 84.5 per cent, and in 1919 it was 83.5 per cent.

Other figures gathered by the committee show that the percentage of assessable intangible property, such as money, notes, accounts and shares of stock is growing smaller.

In 1921 the percentage to all other property was 9.08. In 1920 it was 9.29 and in 1920 3.62. In 1921 the figures were 3.50.

An argument against transferring motor vehicles to the tax roll was made by W. R. Dennis, who said that it would disrupt the present license system, which could not go beyond raising more than enough revenue for policing power.

Counties Get Revenue.
With an array of figures Dennis showed that under the present license system counties are receiving more revenue from this source than if the vehicles were replaced on the tax roll. He also showed that the present system is cheaper for the auto owner than if he paid a property tax based on valuation. Referring to the number of vehicles which escaped taxation under property tax he said that in 1918 only 91 per cent of the registration of that year appeared on the county tax rolls.

The highway construction of the state is based on the auto license, and if the vehicles are transferred to the tax roll it would result in the cost of construction being borne by direct tax. In 1921 the direct tax would have been \$334,000 for interest on highway bonds.

The peak of the highway load will come in 1929 when the sum of \$3,000,000 will be required.

Asked by Chairman Day if he thought the present schedule of motor vehicle licenses would carry additional bonds, \$10,000,000, Dennis said that he thought not. There is a possibility that the saturation point in the number of registrations may be reached sooner than anticipated, he said, in which case all the revenue derived will be necessary to amortize the bonds already outstanding. He said provision should be made to provide a sinking fund for the peak load in 1929. He thought that a danger point had been reached and said the gasoline tax should be zealously protected for highway maintaining.

'THE LOST AND FOUND' IS TOPIC OF WALKER

Evangelist Walker spoke last evening on "The Lost and Found." For background of the sermon he used the 15th chapter of Luke. The parable of the lost sheep and the lost coin brought home the truth of the value we place upon lost articles which we prize.

The pathetic story of the lost boy; how he took his portion of his father's estate and departed from home; was told. "This he spent in an endeavor to gain pleasure and worldly possessions," said the evangelist. "However, just the opposite was his—an empty purse, empty pleasure and empty life. No man gave to him and his hunger drove him to eat for the swine. While there he came to himself and resolved to return home and fill the place of a servant. No thought of sonship was his. His father, however, upon the return of his son, forgave him and great was the rejoicing over the lost boy."

"And so it is true when coming back to the Lord we must come in humbleness of attitude, seeking forgiveness of Him. We are told in the book of life that the angels of heaven rejoice upon the return of even one into its fold. How the Father welcomes his own when they return to Him."

Tonight the subject of the sermon will be "Heaven." The question of whether people will know each other there will be brought out. The "Happy Home" quartet will sing "Lead Kindly Light."

There was one addition to the church at the service last night.
