

BRIGHTER PROSPECTS FOR FARMER SEEN BY CO-OPERATIVE HEADS

That Lane county farmers may begin this year with improved market conditions in sight and with their last year's crop practically cleaned up, is the assertion of several of the heads of different local co-operative marketing organizations. While it is yet early to bank on this year's crops, improved conditions in the east make the local managers predict steady and stable markets that will return a fair price to the farmer for his produce.

The predictions of J. O. Holt, manager of the Eugene Fruit Association, on his return from the east this week that fruit would market well next year, is received by farmers with enthusiasm. Fruit and vegetables were cleaned out slick and clean at fair returns last year and while it is not expected that fortunes will be made this year it is believed the orchards, berry and garden tracts will pay a reasonable return.

Hay Still Dragging.
The principal farm product on the hands of the farmer at the present time is hay. Last year's crop was large and there was not enough stock to feed it to. However, if the cold weather prevails the stock may consume much of the local supply yet.

May Clean Up On Wool.
The prospect for the cleaning up of the two million pounds of wool and mohair pooled by local growers with the Oregon Wool and Mohair Growers' co-operative association, is said to be good. The mohair is all sold and the wool is being disposed of on a rising market, which would make it appear that farmers may make some money on the pool yet.

SMALL TOWNS WOULD TAX STAGES HEAVILY

Junction City is not the only town that would tax auto buses, heavily for the privilege of doing business within their precincts, according to E. J. Schlotman, manager of the Central Stage Terminal at Eugene.

"Cottage Grove wants us to pay an annual license fee of \$50 per car," says Mr. Schlotman, "while Sutherlin seeks to impose a tax of \$150 per car, then reduced the tariff to \$80 and later to \$40. We offered them \$10 which is as high a tax as any stage pays anywhere in Washington—Seattle charges only \$4."

"We also agreed to maintain in Junction City a comfortable waiting room and to make no unnecessary noise with our horns. Our offer was not accepted. So now we are leaving and taking on passengers outside the city limits."

"This arrangement does not work any great hardship on our company, because our business in Junction City is light, due to its proximity to Eugene and the excellent service afforded by two railway lines. The authorities there, however, appear to begrudge us even an occasional passenger."

"We are paying a \$25 license fee at Roseburg. Eugene charges us nothing, probably in recognition of the great amount of business we bring here. Monroe is glad to have our stage service, because they have no other public means of transportation, except a tri-weekly mixed train. We are willing to pay a reasonable tax on our business, but refuse to be held up by Junction City or any other small town."

POSTOFFICE FORMS WELFARE COUNCIL

In accordance with an order issued by Postmaster General Hays, the Eugene postoffice force has formed a welfare council, with the following members: W. F. Lardrum, supervisor; D. G. Shiley, John Holmes and Harry Bartow, clerks; Cecil Henderson, Leon Miller and Gus Johnson, carriers; Clint Chezem, rural carrier. A railway mail clerk is to be appointed.

The officers for this year are: Harry Bartow, chairman; Cecil Henderson, vice chairman; Clint Chezem, secretary. Meetings will be held on the first Friday of each month.

The purpose of the local welfare council, according to the order received, is to promote a better understanding of the work of the postoffice among patrons, secure better cooperation, consider how to increase the efficiency of handling mails and improve working conditions of employees, also anything else which will tend to improve the postal service.

Over Eighteen Millions Expended On Highways

Salem, Ore., Feb. 1.—Expenditures of the state highway department for the period December 1, 1920, to November 30, 1921, aggregated \$18,245,821.37, according to the annual report of the highway commission, completed Monday for filing with Governor Olcott.

Of the total expenditures, \$15,031,655.14 was classified as state funds, \$2,181,956.65 as federal government funds, \$85,811.42 as county funds and \$46,375.16 as railway funds.

The receipts for the year aggregated \$10,507,481.97, including a balance of \$1,822,589.83, which was on hand December 1, 1920. These receipts included \$10,557,250.33 from the sale of bonds, \$1,620,274.70 from motor vehicle license fees, \$948,509.00 from gasoline and distillate tax and \$1,009,985.51 from the market road tax.

Other Revenue Received.
There also were included in the receipts \$2,181,956.65 classified as federal government cooperative payments, \$45,955.26 railroad cooperative payments, \$602,038.25 county cooperative payments, designated as cash, \$3,004.50 county cooperative payments, designated as unpaid warrants, \$14,922.71 interest on bank balances, warrants, etc., \$15,000 increase in revolving fund \$212,608.55 miscellaneous receipts designated as cash, and \$34,420.00 miscellaneous receipts designated as unpaid warrants.
