TROEH NOT CHAMP, BUT GOOD, AT THAT

Frank Troeh didn't grab off a national trapshooting championship in 1921 but the Vancouver, Wash., trapshot had an excellent year just the same. For the past eight years Troeh and his old second-hand Winchester have been going down the line winning championship after championship, grabbing off the high average honors here and there, and at the end of the season being either on the top of the heap or so close to the top that he was making it uncomfortable for the leader.

In 1921 Troeh made 75 runs of better than 100 straight—which is considerably better than the many seasons of E. P. Woodward, of Houston, Tex., who made 55 runs of better than 50. Eleven of Troeh's runs were better than 100 straight and one was over 200. He did not make the longest amateur run of the season. That was made by E. W. Renfro, of Butte, Mont., who scored a run of 235 straight. It was a Winchester rifle that Buffalo Bill cleared the plains with and it was with a Winchester that Renfro made his long run. These western boys appear partial to the gun that opened up the west.

Troeh made the greatest number of high runs over 50 for the professionals. The Glasboro, N. J., shot made 53 runs over 50. Rusty Raze, of Curtis, Neb., made the longest run of the year, a total of 307.

That making long runs isn't the easiest thing in the world to do is proven by the fact that of the many thousands in the shooting tournaments only 14 of them broke over 200 straight—and not one of the 14 was able to repeat. Here are the names of 14 who got into the select class, with the run they compiled.

EUGENEANS RECEIVE FEDERAL AID MONEY

Government compensation calling for expenditures of approximately \$39 a month on the part of Uncle Sam for the benefit of four disabled former service men of Eugene was awarded today by the United States Veterans' Bureau in Seattle.

Joseph Amos Anway, 230 Lincoln street, was awarded a compensation of \$27 a month retroactive to December 24, 1921, for disabilities incurred during the recent war. Other awards were: Kenneth Walter Jones, \$12 a month; Russell David Evans, Y. M. C. A., \$22.50 a month; Louis James Long, R. F. D. No. 3, \$30.50 a month.

Announcement was made at the veteran's bureau today that plans are being formulated to establish drug and dental dispensaries for disabled war veterans in connection with James Long, R. F. D. No. 3, it is stated, will be established in Portland if the necessary money appropriation is forthcoming.

SCHOOLS WILL PLANT MANY ROSES FRIDAY

Twelve dozen cuttings of beautiful Caroline Testout roses, the official variety, are to be planted on Eugene school house grounds Friday. The

cuttings are being made from bushes growing on the grounds of the state capital and again at Salem, under the direction of J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, and will be forwarded to Eugene in time for being planted on Arbor day, which in this state, will be Friday, February 10.

Five grade schools will receive their share of the cuttings, which includes all but the Junior high school, the latter being already plentifully supplied with rose bushes.

The work of planting the cuttings will

be made a part of the opening exercises, and if the weather is propitious other work will be done in beautifying the school grounds. Arbor day will also be observed in other ways by the city schools, although no programs have yet been prepared.

Each teacher has been supplied with a copy of the Arbor day manual for 1922 which is said to be one of the largest and most valuable publications ever issued from the state superintendent's office. In addition to much other useful information, the booklet contains pictures and

descriptions of many beautiful Oregon shrubs, furnished by Prof. Albert R. Sweetser, of the University of Oregon. "Beautiful Oregon Rose," a poem written by H. Edward Mills, is given in both words and music, together with other appropriate compositions.

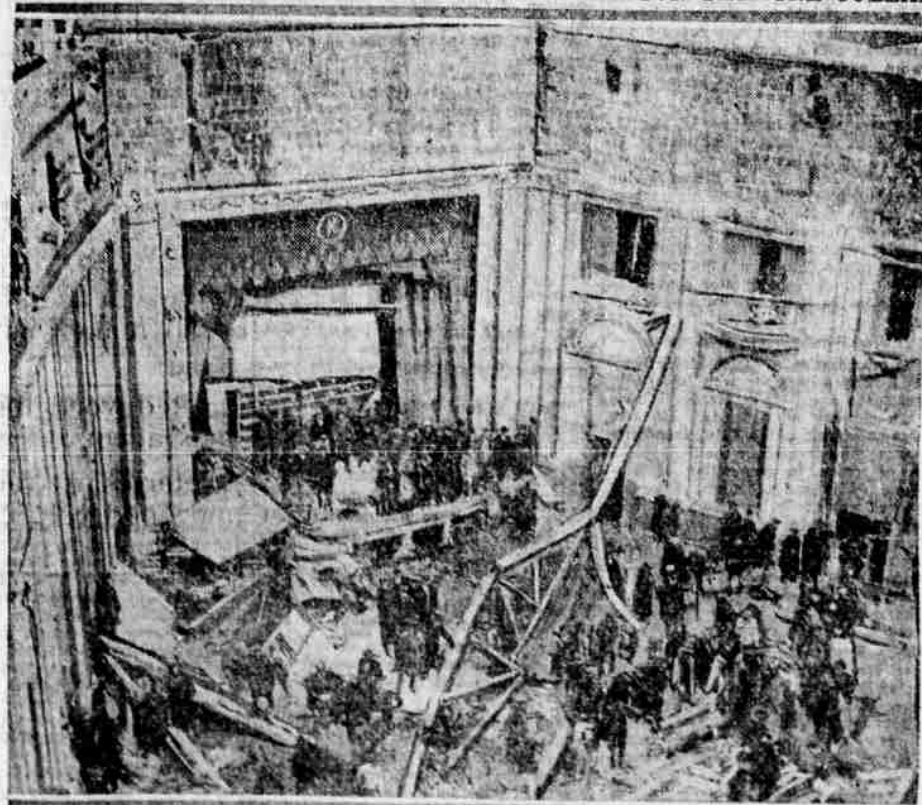
