EUGENE EDUCATORS PUBLISH NEW TEST

A new geography test which local teachers consider a great improvement over old-time methods of school examinations, has been prepared by Dr. C. A. Gregory, of the University of Oregon, and Fred Peter L. Spencer, of the University of high school.

Educators have long felt the need of some system of testing a pupil's knowledge of a subject, which would not depend mostly upon his ability to think and remember quickly and accurately to express his ideas in written language, this being the common fault of most test methods.

The Gregory-Spencer system suggests to each question three plausible replies, either one of which might be true, the pupil being required to merely check the correct answer. Instead of tolling for hours over a lot of poorly written answers, the teacher merely compares the answers on cards which are laid over each page of the test. These cards are marked so the correct replies can be determined at a glance. No harrowing judgments of grading are required, for the scoring is simply one of mathematics, the grade being found by subtracting from the number of correct replies one-half of those which are wrong. More than 100 answers can in this manner be graded in two minutes.

While 17 questions are the most that are given in any of the old-style exams, the new test contains 111. Ten of these relate to trade routes and their products, 15 to miscellaneous geography, 10 to general geography of the United States and an equal number to similar queries about the world, while 66 relate to political and place geography.

There are three forms of the test, which is designed for the sixth, seventh and eighth grades. In preparing their test the authors studied and analyzed over 1,000 state examination questions from 23 states.

WHEAT HITS HIGHEST FIGURE IN 5 MONTHS

Wheat has gone up with a bound this past day or two, and it seems destined to rise still higher, according to Elmer Paine, manager of the Eugene Mill and Elevator company.

Today it is being quoted at this mill at 93 and 95 cents a bushel. This is for No. 1 quality, sacked.

Today's prices, it is said, are the highest of any for the past five months. Farmers who held onto a portion of their crop now seem about ready to cash in for better money than they expected during the early part of the winter.

Mr. Paine says the raise is due to the surplus of Argentina and Australia being rapidly sold off.

PRICE WAR AMONG TRACTOR MAKERS UPSETS BUSINESS

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 7.—Harold F. McCormick has abandoned pursuits of art, grand opera and globe trotting to direct the price war of the International Harvester company with the Ford concern on tractors.

Ford, who started the price slashing with a cut of almost 50 per cent in the price of tractors, has been followed by the Harvester company, the J. I. Case Plow works and the Sampson tractors, controlled by General Motors.

McCormick has taken up his residence in Chicago and plans to remain here for some time directing the affairs of his company. The harvester company, in addition to cutting prices, is giving plows and other machinery away with purchases of tractors, while other concerns are offering similar bonuses.

McCormick today refused to define further his plans for the campaign of price cutting against Ford.

Manufacturers Possimistic.
St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 7.—Tractor manufacturers here for the National Tractor and Power Farming exposition found their business completely upset by the tractor price war.

None of the companies exhibiting at the show have cut prices but they have found their business seriously affected by the war now in progress among the four largest manufacturers of tractors.

"I do not believe that price cutting is going to do them any good," said G. L. Gillette, president of the Twin City company, closely allied with the Minneapolis Street and Machinery company.

"Most of the reliable companies have already announced three or four reasonable price reductions. Prices are now as low as they can be on the basis of sound business. Agents cannot afford to give service on small margins and the manufacturers who are giving service have gone as far as they can go. These price cuts are not justifiable."

Today's session is also being held in that vicinity while Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock a meeting will be held at the Alvadore store, and the afternoon session will be devoted to pruning demonstrations in that vicinity.

Thursday's meeting is at Creswell grange hall at 10 o'clock. Professor Clayton L. Long, of O. A. C. County Fruit Inspector C. E. Stewart and Ira D. Whitney, county agricultural agent, are conducting the demonstrations.

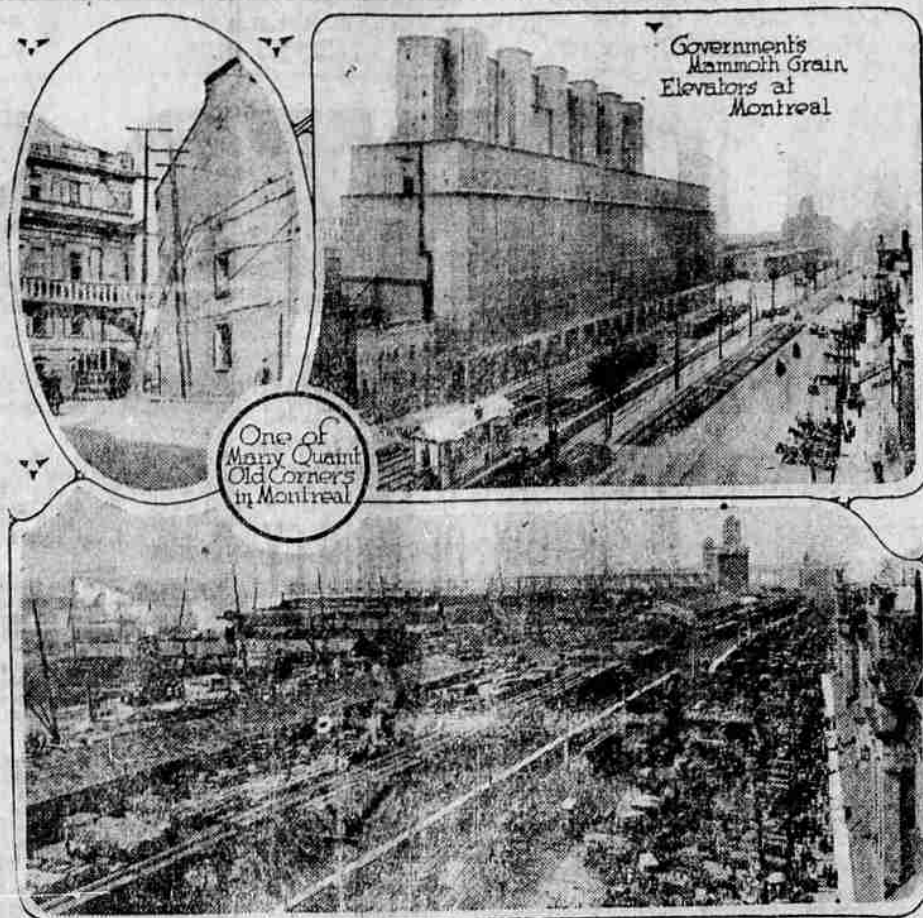

INLAND PORT OF MONTREAL: A GEOGRAPHICAL ANOMALY



One of Many Quaint Old Corners in Montreal

Montreal's Busy Water Front

That the second largest port in America is five hundred miles from an ocean, may appear an impossibility to many. However, it is a fact. Montreal, the metropolis of Canada and the fifth city of North America is this port on the St. Lawrence River, 250 miles nearer to Liverpool than is New York.

The vast tonnage of grains grown on the western plains of Canada and the United States, a large proportion of which is shipped to Europe, has been the main factor in the development of the Port of Montreal which is today the principal American port for the export of grain. This grain is brought by train and lake boats to two mammoth elevators in Montreal and from them loaded onto ocean freighters. Nine boats

can be landed simultaneously from these store-houses.

In order to handle the millions of bushels of grain expeditiously, this harbor is equipped with sixty miles of railway and twelve miles of wharves. Harbor improvements have absorbed over thirty millions of dollars and additional improvements have been planned which will call for more millions.

Today the harbor can accommodate one hundred steamships from 350 to 750 feet in length, providing depths of twenty-five to thirty-five feet of water. During 1931 twelve terminal and approximately one thousand vessels arrived at and sailed from this harbor.

Montreal has attained her prominence as a great port with the help of a seven months navigation season and during this past

season exported 119,602,189 bushels of grain. This was more than twice last year's volume and over forty-four millions more than the previous record year of 1914. Exports of Canadian cattle is growing to such proportions that more bottoms are needed. About twenty additional trans-Atlantic passenger steamers are scheduled to use Montreal as their western port and additional cargo steamers are also expected to run between the Canadian metropolis and European ports.

This delightful French-Canadian city, whose site was selected by Champlain, and which has been popular with tourists because of its historical features, is fast becoming a great commercial center. American capital is being attracted for investment in industrial projects of many sorts.

NOW IS TIME TO BUILD HOMES. ADVISE PROMINENT LUMBERMEN

"Now is the time to build," advises J. A. Griffin, of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company. "The price of lumber has reached bottom and is beginning the upward climb. High prices are not in immediate prospect, but there is a general stiffening of values all along the line, due to increased demand and low supply. There is absolutely no foundation on which to rest hopes for lower lumber prices."

Labor Cheap Now.
"Much the same condition prevails with regard to labor, except in regard to depleted stocks. Labor is plentiful and wages the lowest they have been for years, with every reason to believe that within a few months men will be scarce and wages as high or higher than they are now."

As soon as spring opens up many workmen will be needed for farm work and in other industries, leaving less help for those who wish to build.

"The only possible objection to building now is the cold weather, which will, we hope—soon be a thing of the past. Plastering dries a little slowly, but this small disadvantage is offset many times by building when labor and lumber can be had on such favorable terms."

People Planning Homes.
"More people are planning now to build than for years," says John H. MacDonald, of the Fischer-Soultz Lumber company, according to architects and others in touch with the situation. During the first three months of last year building permits, amounting to nearly \$75,000 were issued in Eugene, the total for the year being \$302,000.

"The time to build is when you have the money or can make advantageous credit arrangements. Those who need residences can gain nothing by postponing building. The need of good home of one's own is felt more keenly during cold, disagreeable weather, such as we are having now. When the days are warm and pleasant people are tempted to postpone, providing themselves with adequate housing accommodations, an act of procrastination which is apt to be regretted as soon as cold weather comes again."
