BROWN'S GROCERY ROBBED OF \$7.60

Brown's grocery store, Fifth and Willamette streets, was robbed of \$7.60 last night. The thieves shattered the glass in the front door, reached in and broke the night lock, then opened the cash register and removed all the money it contained.

The robbery was committed sometime after midnight, according to Acting Chief of Police Jenkins, who states that the building had not been molested up to that time. The broken door and missing funds were discovered by the proprietor at 5 o'clock this morning. No clue to the marauders has been discovered.

Food Price Decline Is Shown During January

Food costs in January declined perceptibly, chiefly on account of the drop in prices of poultry and dairy products, according to the survey of the Four-11 Bulletin, the organ of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen. The average last month in Oregon was \$1.51 daily per capita in a typical family of five persons, which was the same as the Idaho average, but 1 cent a day higher than the Washington average. The average in January for the three states in December was \$1.55, while in June it was \$1.51. The Portland average of \$1.40 per capita daily in January compared with \$1.47 for Seattle and \$1.49 for Spokane. Interior and coast points in Oregon and Washington show higher averages than in the larger cities.

S. P. COMPANY BUYS 200,000 YARDS ROCK FOR TRACK BALLAST

The Southern Pacific company has recently placed an order for 200,000 yards of Oregon crushed rock, worth at retail a half million dollars. The quarry where the rock is to be obtained is located in Jackson county, but a similar quantity would be purchased in Lane county if a suitable quality of material could be found in an accessible location, according to B. L. King, of Portland, superintendent of maintenance and operation, who inspected the line to Wendling yesterday.

Calls for Student Help.

"Students at the University of Oregon might profitably spend some time in examining the mineral deposits of Lane county," suggested Mr. King. "If they could locate a quarry of ballasting rock it would prove a valuable asset to this section. Our company uses immense quantities of this material on our lines and when a suitable quality of rock is found it is shipped hundreds of miles."

"Senator Day is opening in Lane county a rock quarry from which we expect to purchase a large quantity of material. The deposit is located about two miles from Shedd, to which the material is conveyed by a small private railroad. The deposit in Jackson county is on the railroad which connects Jacksonville with Medford. This line has been purchased recently by J. M. O'Byrne, whose hopes of profitable operation are based largely upon hauling this material to our line."

"Abandoning Use of Hottel Granite." The Southern Pacific is abandoning the use of decomposed granite, which was obtained from southern Oregon, because it was not sufficiently heavy and firm for ballasting purposes. It is generally supposed that any kind of rock is good enough for ballasting a railroad, but such is not the case. In order to be accepted by B. E. Mayo, our division engineer, rock for ballast must pass a severe test. River bed gravel is hard enough, but not sufficiently flat to remain in place, even after crushing, because one side is round. We use rock crushed to make three-fourths to one and one-half inches in diameter.

"Bus Competition Worries S. P." "Competition with motor buses and auto trucks has become well-nigh unbearable," continued Mr. King. "These vehicles are given the free use of truckage which the people, including the Southern Pacific company, are taxed to build. Our taxes in Oregon amount to more than a million dollars yearly, being larger than that of any other corporation in the state. This is unfair competition, a fact which people are beginning to realize. The recent special session of the legislature passed a law forcing auto transportation companies to take out accident insurance. Their liability, however, is limited, while the liability of the railroads in such cases is practically unlimited, judging by the amount of damages which they sometimes pay for accidental injury or death."

"To Improve Service." The Southern Pacific is endeavoring to meet auto competition by improving its interurban train service in every way possible. The new train schedule which goes into effect Sunday gives Eugene practically hourly service to Portland in the afternoon. We are cutting down the time of our fast trains between Portland and Corvallis until this 100-mile trip will be made in about three hours. The electrification of the west side line will be extended from Corvallis to Eugene just as the development of contiguous territory warrants the improvement, which should not be many years hence."

CHAMBER BESIEGED BY HOMESEAKER LETTERS

That many people are planning on coming west this spring and have their eyes on the fertile Willamette valley, is indicated by the score of letters being received from the middle west, south and east by the Eugene Chamber of Commerce. Most of the inquiries are desirous of obtaining small farms or orchard and berry tracts. Many want to raise poultry and run small dairies.

The leading states in the number of farm inquiries are Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, Nebraska and Kansas and Texas. All classes of people are desirous of farms, from the man who wants someone to pay his fare west to capitalists. Crop failures in these sections and severe winters and given as the reason for wanting to come to Oregon. Washington, Idaho and Montana people are writing to the chamber almost daily asking about prospects in this vicinity. While many of the writers appear to be professional booklet collectors, the greater majority have either come through Eugene by rail or automobile or have had relatives either living here or have visited in this section, according to Secretary Eugene Chudwick. Mr. Chudwick is of the belief that as soon as the homeseekers' rates go into effect many will come west. A second edition of both the Eugene scenic guide and the farm booklet is to be printed soon to take care of the incessant demand for literature on this country.

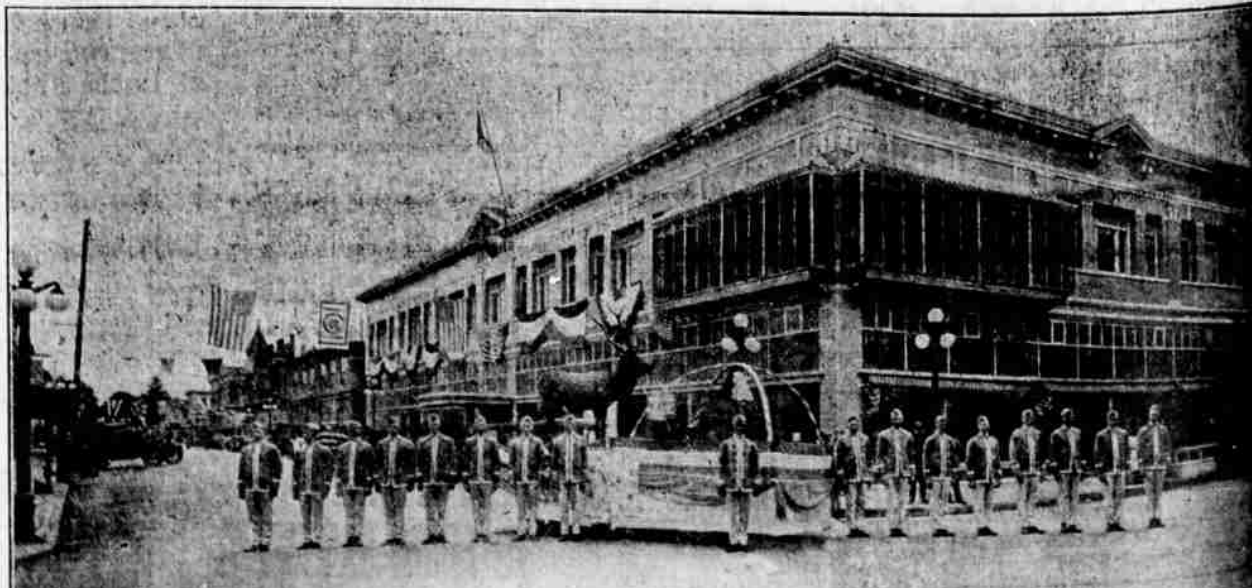
