Most of the local boys have been training under E. A. Britton, physical director, of the Y. M. C. A., and feel more than competent to down their Oregon City challengers.

Has "Auto Stile"—
A new invention to transport over a fence, thus saving a delay in opening a gate is the "auto stile," devised and used by Henry Schuman-Heinek of the Siskiyou Orchards near Gold Hill. The inventor has sent a photograph of his "auto stile" to I. T. Sparks, district freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific. The "auto stile" consists of two trough-like appliances which curve over the fence and in which the wheels of the machine run.

Adjusts Fire Loss—
The fire loss on the Morgan Watson house has been adjusted by Charles Emery, local representative of the Oregon Fire Relief association, on the basis of what it would cost to repair the damage, according to the estimate of a local contractor. 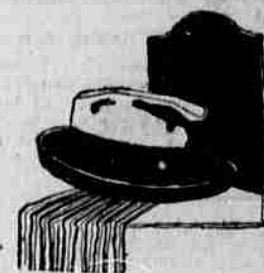
