## SCHROFF'S PAINTINGS DRAW MANY VISITORS

The Schroff exhibit of more than 100 paintings of Oregon and California scenery proved a big drawing card at the informal open-house reception given by the Chamber of Commerce last evening. Hundreds of visitors thronged the dining-room and overflowed into the parlors, admiring the works of art which metamorphosed the room into a beautiful art gallery.

"What would eastern people think if they knew that such an exhibit was being held here in Eugene, Oregon?" a question was heard to remark. "Many eastern people go to Boston, New York, Philadelphia and other eastern cities after they have become wealthy, because of the culture, refinement and art found in those places. If we could make Eugene noted for such things, those people would remain here to spend their money and lend their influence to the further artistic enrichment of our city."

"Paris receives \$20,000,000 tourist money per annum, largely because it is the world's art center. We might profit by her example. Alfred H. Schroff, C. J. Fulton and other local artists have the talent to make Eugene an art center, provided they have proper encouragement."

**Paintings Are Admired.**

Many expressions of admiration of the paintings were heard, as well as discriminating criticisms. Most of the pictures were of outdoor scenes near Eugene, around Neah Kah Nie and in the vicinity of Monterey.

"Brilliantly colored is perhaps the most outstanding characteristic of the Schroff pictures. A highly developed sense of color values is necessary to appreciate such paintings, as well as colors seen in nature, say art enthusiasts."

In addition to the 94 catalogued paintings, a number of Schroff's pictures which are privately owned were loaned for the occasion.

**Music Adds to Evening.**

Music was furnished by Miss Helen Harper, violinist; Miss Lora Johnson, cellist; and Miss Beulah Clark, pianist. Dancing was enjoyed by some of the guests, late in the evening.

"The proposed Portland exposition would greatly stimulate the study of art at the University of Oregon," remarked Arvid Fairbanks, of the art department of the university. "The pictures which Oregon art students would exhibit there would show the millions of eastern visitors that Oregon, and especially Eugene, is a most desirable place of residence for people of culture and refinement."

## As the World Wags

**THE HUMAN WASHINGTON** has been exalted into a kind of heroic demigod in the national imagination and at the same time has been very much ill-treated. On the one hand he has become a kind of bloodless statue of wisdom and virtue and on the other has had his vulgarest adjectives which exhibit him as being an insufferable little prig and as such he has become the object of ridicule for several generations of wits or would-be wits.

**MATH-MAKING** has come perfectly natural to us humans and even in this materialistic and supposedly scientific age we cling to our myths as fondly as in less sophisticated times. About the early life of the great we inclined to exaggerate commonplace episodes into unusual exhibitions of precocity. We even told with fancy the days of our own youth as a glamorous haze of mystery about the "ole swimmin' hole" or the doings of "our old gang."

**WASHINGTON** was an extremely reticent individual and was ever a dour man. He was of the type to inspire legends. In addition he was so uninterested in to become the helpless victim of that slovenly and inaccurate historian, Parson Weems, who was a kind of itinerant preacher who financed his wandering partly by writing and peddling books. Washington was an unusually good subject for him as a popular hero when still a small child because a kind of a ward of Laurence Washington.

## HOUSE MOVING LAW MAY BE CHANGED BY COUNCIL COMMITTEE

The house-moving ordinance is being reconsidered by the judiciary committee of the city council, to which it was referred by the council last night at a special meeting. This action was taken as a result of a series of strong demands by J. W. Bluminger, house mover, for a refund of the fees required by the city for each house moved.

Mr. Bluminger said that if the present law was not changed that he and his competitor in the house moving business here would discontinue operations in Eugene, considering the charge of \$15 for moving even the smallest house, or even a garage, to be excessive.

Councilman Walker explained that the fee was designated to pay for damage to trees and streets and interference with traffic. Councilman Sims added that the city intended to discourage the moving of small, poor houses, which had the effect of lowering property values in the district to which they were moved.

**Sewer Ordinance Passes.**

Following the announcement by City Attorney O. H. Foster that the city could not lawfully assess a portion of the cost of the Franklin boulevard sewer to the Southern Pacific company, because the improvement, a resident on that street told the council that the proposed sewer was neither asked for nor desired by himself and other property owners on the thoroughfare mentioned because they were using septic tanks. Councilman Parks explained that the sewer was to be constructed for the purpose of doing away with the septic tanks, from which foul odors arose, especially during the summer season. The ordinance was passed.

**Projects Laid Over.**

A petition for a sewer on Moss street from Franklin to Garden and one on Garden to Walnut was allowed, but the project on Grand street was laid over for further investigation, as was the petition to pave Ferry street from Eighth to Ninth avenue.

The ordinance which provides for the grading and graveling of Adams street from Eighth to Eleventh avenue was amended to provide for the improvement of alley entrances at the expense of abutting property owners.

**New Lights for Council Chamber.**

New light fixtures will be installed in the council chamber, as a result of a motion made by Councilman Walker, who complained that the existing lights were hard on the eye and often caused headaches.

Councilman Quimby made a detailed report of his investigation of the case of Mrs. Killinger, an 80-year-old woman who recently fell on a broken sidewalk and received injuries for which she seeks compensation. Mr. Quimby was instructed to make further investigations.

Salem, Ore., Feb. 21.—Governor Olcott has appointed C. F. Strong as judge of Klamath county, succeeding Kayendall, resigned.

**Mexican Ex-General Held**  
By U. C. Border Officials

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 21.—American federal authorities today moved drastically to enforce neutrality laws along the Mexican border.
