

OREGON SENATOR IN IDAHO DEAL

Boise, Idaho, Feb. 28.—After an acrimonious debate of four and a half solid hours in a busy meeting that jammed the hall of the house of representatives, a set of resolutions was adopted at a late hour today which condemned the bill now in the hands of President Harding, providing for an exchange of 200,000 acres of Northern Pacific lands in Northern Idaho for range lands in southern Idaho and called upon the Idaho delegation in congress to do all in its power to induce the president to veto the measure.

Serious charges were hurled back and forth by the opposing forces. Fred W. Gooding had hurried home from Washington to be present at the meeting. He brought with him Governor Fenn and J. H. Clinton, who are to exercise an option on the 200,000 acres of cut-over land if the bill becomes a law. Hugh Sprunt, president of the Idaho Woolgrowers' association; S. W. McClure, for years secretary of the National Woolgrowers' association, and a number of lawyers.

Interests Are Blamed.
Miles Cannon, state commissioner of agriculture, asserts that the proposed land exchange was prompted on behalf of a small group of private interests. Through this exchange it is charged that big sheep corporations are aiming to control practically all the grazing land in southern Idaho outside of the forest reserves. This was to be done, it is alleged, by selecting alternate sections and land around watering places in a way to shut out all other sheep and cattle men.

Senator Borah is said to have agreed to ask the return to congress of the bill for further consideration.
Attacks Sheep Companies.
Commissioner Cannon also has launched an assault against Senator R. N. Stanfield of Oregon and the sheep companies in which he is interested and other sheep companies. The specific charge made by Commissioner Cannon is that these concerns are far in arrears in payment to farmers throughout this section for the purchase of quantities of grain and hay.

"I have on file in my office," Commissioner Cannon said, "claims against the R. N. Stanfield company alone aggregating thousands of dollars. These claims are for hay and grain furnished

so this corporation in the spring of 1921 and for which the hard-pressed farmers and settlers have been unable to get pay. Commander Cannon said he had taken the matter up with Attorney General Roy L. Black and that he would be guided by the advice of that official. Some of the claims have been paid as a result of publicity already given the matter by the commissioner, he asserted.

According to Commissioner Cannon Senator Stanfield controls six corporations organized and doing business in Idaho in addition to his operations in Oregon.

The Idaho commissioner has been criticized for the actions he has taken in this matter. After his first attack Chas. E. Feinson, a certified public accountant of Weiser demanded to know "when the commissioner of agriculture was given authority to become the financial publicist, agent and debt collector for the Idaho farmers."

Commissioner Cannon rests on his authorization to investigate all cases of this nature having to do with the handling and marketing of farm products.

START TO COLLECT TAXES TOMORROW

Payment of the first half 1921 taxes will start tomorrow at the sheriff's office, according to announcement today. The office is in readiness to receive the first half taxes which must be paid by April 5, or they become delinquent and start drawing interest. After the first half taxes are paid the second half will not become delinquent until October 5. Taxpayers are requested to bring their tax receipts with them or enclose them in the letter when taxes are mailed. If the receipt does not accompany the payment it is necessary for the office to make out another which takes considerable time and expense. It is urged that the taxpayers cooperate with the collectors to this extent.

TERRACING BUTTE IS FAVORED BY M'CCLAIN

C. A. McClain, superintendent of Eugene's water system, believes that the most feasible plan for beautifying Skinner butte is to terrace the south side and plant vines and shrubbery along the level places. The soil is thin, says Mr. McClain, and the location so steep, in addition to the south exposure, that an enormous amount of water would be required to maintain a green carpet of grass there during the summer season.

Vines and shrubs send their roots down and can be watered from a small ditch on a level terrace, which need not be very wide. These would require only a small amount of water, compared to what would be needed to sprinkle the entire surface and keep grass green and growing, he says. The shrubbery and vines would soon spread and cover most of the hillside, which would then present a pleasing appearance, Mr. McClain believes.

The cost of installing the necessary pipes to distribute the water over which butte has been the chief obstacle which has prevented this improvement, explains Mr. McClain. Two years ago four-inch pipe cost \$1.10 per foot. The price has since dropped to 70 cents. Referring to waste water from the reservoir, Mr. McClain states that the latter is drained four times a year, but it is not emptied during the dry season, which comprises July, August and portions of June and September.

The amount of waste from seepage is considered negligible.
Mr. McClain adds that during his term of office there has never been any disagreement between the water and park boards regarding the irrigation of Skinner butte. Additional water for this purpose could be obtained by the use of auxiliary pumps, which are old and cannot be operated economically, being kept for emergency purposes.

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UNIVERSAL SUFFRAGE DEFEATED IN JAP DIET

Tokio, Feb. 28.—Universal suffrage for Japan was finally defeated after more than a week of stormy debate and parliament jockeying by the diet late last night. Defeat of the suffrage measure means that property and similar qualifications now attached to the right of franchise and which prevents a large proportion of the Japanese people from voting will continue in effect.

The debate on the suffrage measure aroused Japan and gave rise to demonstration which at times nearly reached the proportions of rioting.

At one time a crowd estimated at 50,000 surged around the parliament buildings. Police and troops were called to handle the throngs and to protect the diet and the homes of high officials.

Armed Bandits Overpower Messenger; \$7,000 Stolen

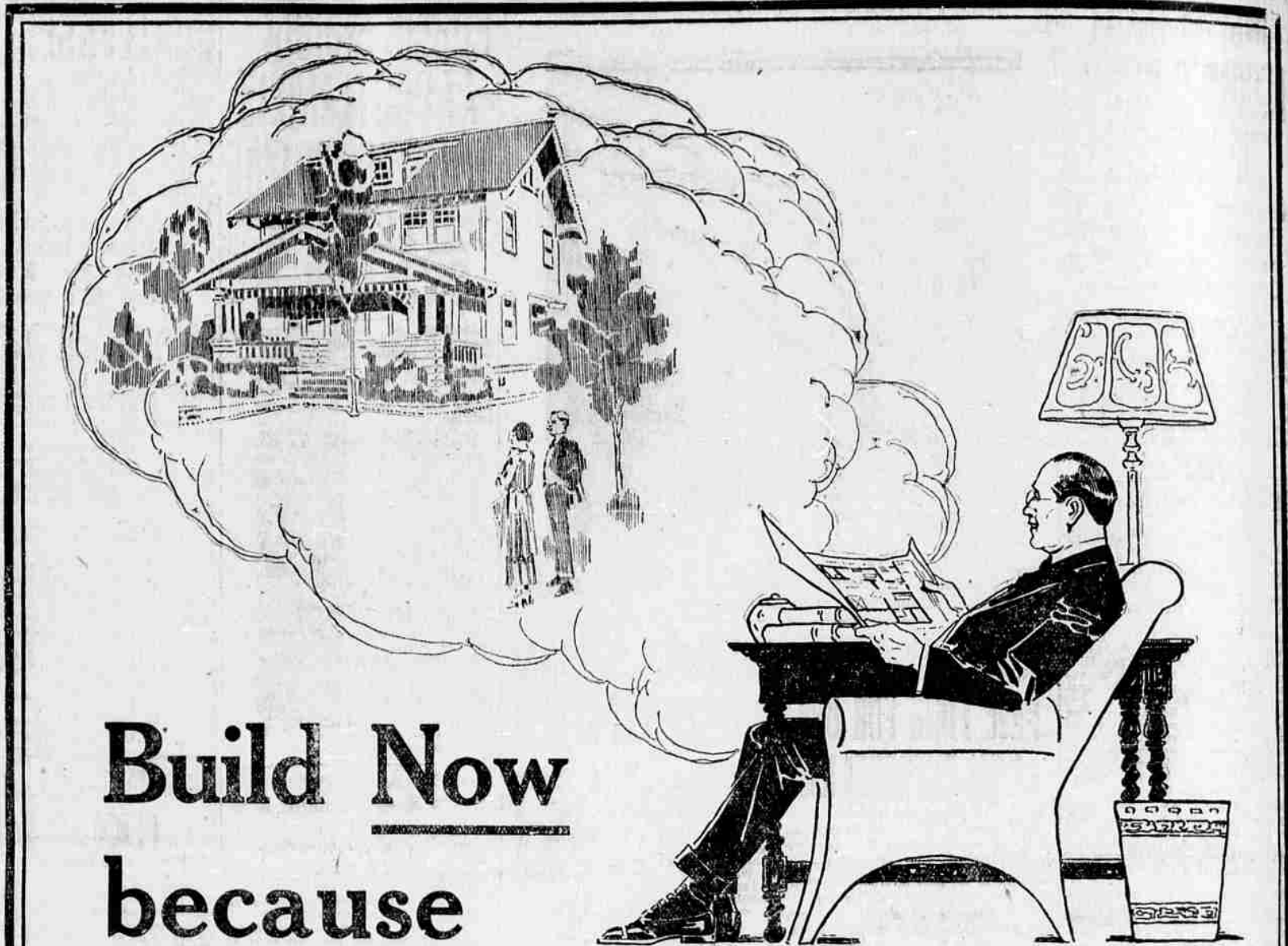
