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HARDING HAS WAY TO SETTLE CABINET ROW

Washington, March 8.—President Harding believes the controversy now in progress between Secretary of Agriculture Wallace and Secretary of the Interior Fall, should be terminated by ending the present division of authority over Alaska, it was said at the White House today.

The present division of power between the two departments is hampering Alaskan development, Harding believes. There was no indication as to how Harding would consolidate authority.

The dispute was also brought out in congress. Following Fall's action in making public a letter in which it was revealed that he had authorized his department to ask President Harding to protect him against "serious attacks emanating from the department of agriculture," leaders of the farm bloc in both houses stated they would strongly oppose Fall's plan to transfer the forestry service which controls the Alaskan forests to the department of interior from the department of agriculture. Representative Haugen, Iowa, chairman of the house agricultural committee, stated unless the department of interior ceased its efforts of the transfer, a bill would be passed by congress taking away from the department of the interior its control of all public lands. Senator Capper said he, and that probably many other members of the farm bloc, are opposed to the transfer.

NEAR-CHAMPS SPENT TIME 'LICKING' JACK

New York, N. Y., March 8.—When one William Harrison Dempsey isn't within swinging distance, most of the next-under heavies will "stop him" any time they get a couple of listeners.

Bill Brennan has been knocked out twice by the champion, but he contends he was the victim of an accident twice and that the third time the accident will bounce back on Dempsey.

Acting on advice, Harry Wills isn't saying anything, but he has plenty of mouthpieces who will picture Dempsey on the floor in about three rounds.

Even Harry Greb will whip the heavyweight king twice a day if he gets an audience. According to Greb, he whipped the champion so badly when he was acting as his sparring partner before the Brennan fight that Dempsey will hardly speak to him now.

After spending large parts of many days listening to Dempsey's downfall it is unusual to find one contender who says he is not the superior of the champion. Tom Gibbons, who fights Greb here next Monday night, is the "freak." He says that Dempsey is the greatest heavyweight in the ring and that he does not want anything to do with him for at least a year.

"Later, but not now," he says. The St. Paul boy looks to be the best in the group from which Dempsey may have to select his next opponent. It is true that he is practically untried, but it is not his fault. The fact that his record looks like the roll call at a set-up convention is a tribute to his ability. The good ones have given him the passkey for two years.

Gibbons looks like a sure winner by a knockout when he gets Greb in the ring. The Pittsburgh boy is fast, but he can't hit, and Gibbons is punching harder than ever before.

Madalynne Obenchain Will Go on Stand Today

Los Angeles, Cal., March 8.—Madalynne Obenchain herself was to take the stand this afternoon in her trial for alleged complicity with Arthur C. Borch in the shooting of John Belton Kennedy.

She will tell for the first time the story of her tangled and tragic romance with the young broker, who was murdered at Beverly Glen, her attorneys asserted.

"I am ready," Madalynne said, as the court opened. "I have waited and prayed for this day, when I can tell my story. It will be a strain, for I am not very well, but it cannot compare with the terrible, deadening suspense of the past months."

"I am going to tell some things I have never breathed before. I know I shall be acquitted."

The reported reduction would affect Kansas, Missouri, Iowa, Oklahoma, Arkansas and southern Wyoming.

GRAY DIGGER WAR OPENS ON APRIL 3

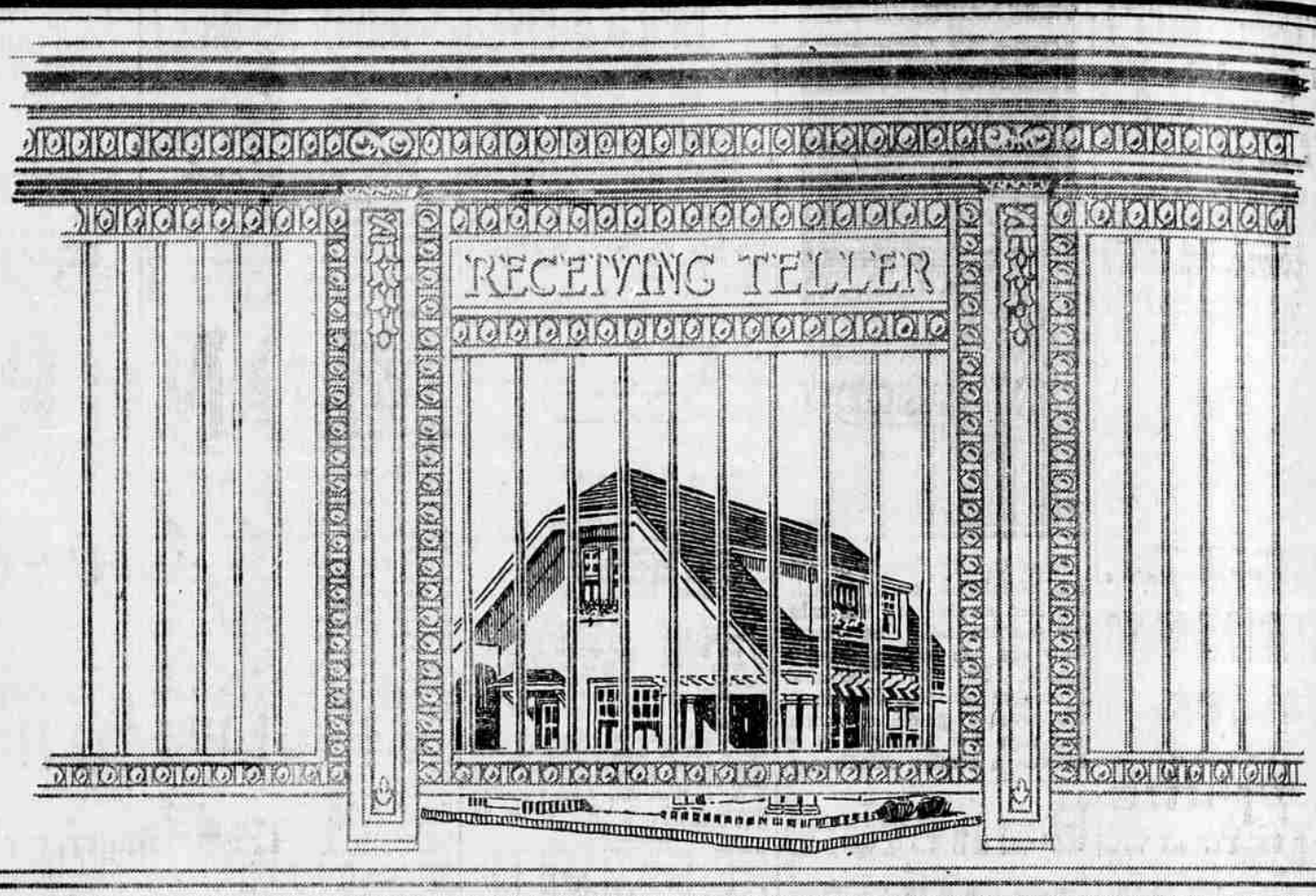
