With a total of \$8,702 in the treasury as the result of the annual drive for funds so far, Eugene Y. M. C. A. officials will start next Monday and will work for three days to bring in the remaining \$1,298 needed to reach the \$10,000 mark set.

Booth-Kelly Gets Wood Contract—
A contract for furnishing 650 cords of body fir slabs, equal at \$4.15 per cord for the use of the city schools during the next school year was awarded to the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, at a special meeting of the school board Saturday afternoon. Delivery of the fuel must start by June 1 and be finished by the fifteenth of August.

Receive Twelve Prizes—

A total of 500 prizes were distributed Saturday evening among the women who registered at the home products store at the Oregon products show last week, the number of which was estimated at between 4000 and 5000. The value of the products displayed at the show was placed at \$50,000, judging by the temporary insurance policies taken out by exhibitors.

Wants Support of Chamber—

The Kallispell, Montana, Chamber of Commerce has written to the Eugene chamber urging it to support the proposed off land provision of the measure. This feature has been eliminated from the bill in the senate, it is said. The provision for off land reclamation service carried a \$500,000,000 appropriation and the Kallispell chamber believes this most important for Oregon and Montana.
