ROOKS MAY NOT LAND BERTHS THIS SEASON

New York, March 13.—Spring is never complete without the discovery of a couple of Cobles, several speakers and a Ruth or two.

These usual harbingers of the season, however, are missing this year, as there seems to be only a fair quality of rookies dispersing around in the south.

Out of the flocks of youngsters trying for jobs with the 16 major league clubs, only a few will land regular places where a plug in some vital weakness is imperative.

John McGraw has to have a center-fielder because he has not a regular player for the position, so one of the Giant rookies is sure of the job.

Miller Huggins is facing the same problem to get two outfielders for his Yankees until Ruth and Meusel serve their time. Two rookies may step in there for six weeks.

Young pitchers may have a chance to step into a good job with every club in the league, but they don't usually step in without the process of stepping up through the bush.

College men are represented by an unusual number of candidates and it will be interesting to watch how the theory of the old timers works out that they all have to be polished on the small time.

It is a good theory, as Frank Frisch is one of the few star players in the game who stepped off the college diamond into the big leagues and made good.

The Giants are the same as the 1921 champions with the exception of Heinie Groh and a new middle gardener, Ralph Shinnert, the high-priced Indianapolis youngster, and Bill Cunningham, the Pacific coast lanky fly chaser, are likely candidates at George Burns' successor.

The Cincinnati Reds will break out this season with an infield imported from California and the personnel of the club will show many changes.

The Yanks have several new faces on their pitching staff—Jones, Bush, etc.—and a new shortstop, Everett Scott. The Red Sox have three or four new faces and the Cleveland Indians have several strange names on the payroll. Washington has a couple of new ones and the Boston Braves have Marquard and Kopf as newcomers.

Thomas K. Campbell Enters Race for Commissioner

Portland, March 13.—Thomas K. Campbell, 917 East Kelly street, Portland, who served as a member of the state public service commission from March, 1907, to January 1, 1917, six years of that time being as chairman, has announced himself as a candidate for a place on the commission at the primaries. He was elected from the western district, his home then being at Cottage Grove, but this time he will run at large for the position held by Fred A. Williams, present chairman.

German Says Giant Aircraft To Run from N. Y. to Chicago

New York, March 12.—By the first of next year giant dirigibles, of German make will carry on regular passenger service between New York and Chicago, according to Dr. Johannes Schuette, German scientist and manufacturer who has just sailed for Berlin on the United States line steamer America.

The dirigibles will be operated by an American company the name of which has not yet been made public, Schuette said.

The huge ships will carry 100 passengers.
