Less than 20 Gifts of \$1,000 to Wilson Fund

New York, April 5.—The widespread popularity of the plan to honor former President Wilson through public service awards to be made by the Woodrow Wilson Foundation is proven by the 130,000 contributors who have given an average of five dollars each, according to Franklin D. Roosevelt, national chairman. Mr. Roosevelt said today that the purposes of the originators of the tribute to Mr. Wilson are being realized in that the endowment of the awards when it is completed will represent the pilgrimages of over 200,000 persons in person or by letter to the various state and local offices of the Foundation with their tokens through which they hope to perpetuate the ideals of Mr. Wilson.

"It is much more fitting," said Mr. Roosevelt, "that this Foundation should represent the approval of the many for Mr. Wilson than that it should be the private contribution of a few men of large means. Small sums have come by the thousands every day since the campaign opened from those who wish to acclaim the idealism of the former president."

Mr. Roosevelt stressed the fact that less than a score of gifts of \$1,000 or over has been received.

The largest gift recorded, he announced, is one of \$10,000 made by Henry Ford, and the next largest are one of \$2,500 from R. A. Long, of Kansas City, and an anonymous contribution for the same amount which came from Washington. So far as has been reported to national headquarters in this city these are the only three contributions over \$1,000.

Ochs, Ralph Pulitzer, Railway Employees Division of the American Federation of Labor, Robert J. F. Schwarzenbach, and Mrs. Willard D. Straight.

OPERETTA BIG SUCCESS

Catherine Pratt as Wilhelmina, carried her part with ease and has an exceptionally fine voice for a young girl. Lauretta Zahn who played Hilda, was especially good in her speaking parts. Cecil Ireland as Franz, and Theodore Johnson as Hans were very good, while James Howard as Bob Yankee made a typical Yankee salesman.

While the characters were good, too much cannot be said of the chorus work. The first chorus of ten girls led by Doris Howard as Katrina, showed wonderful training and carried out their dances and steps and songs beautifully. The entire cast showed excellent training.

The climax of the evening came when little Loraine Stout aged four and Fay Woolley aged six, sang "I'm Looking for a Boy" which is the most popular duet in the operetta. They were so sweet in their Dutch costumes and carried out their part with a grace and charm that other players could well envy.

Mrs. Pratt, who graduated from Albany college conservatory and then did special work in Portland, and post-graduate work in Boston in the New England conservatory, is a very fine director and has been in this work for years. She is especially successful with children.

The people of Wendling are so pleased with the beauty of this production that after many requests, Mrs. Pratt has consented to repeat the operetta Friday evening.

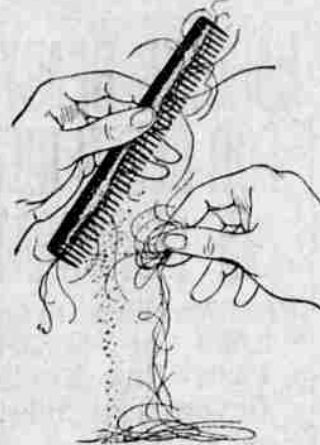
But society gossip declared she would never marry the millionaire.

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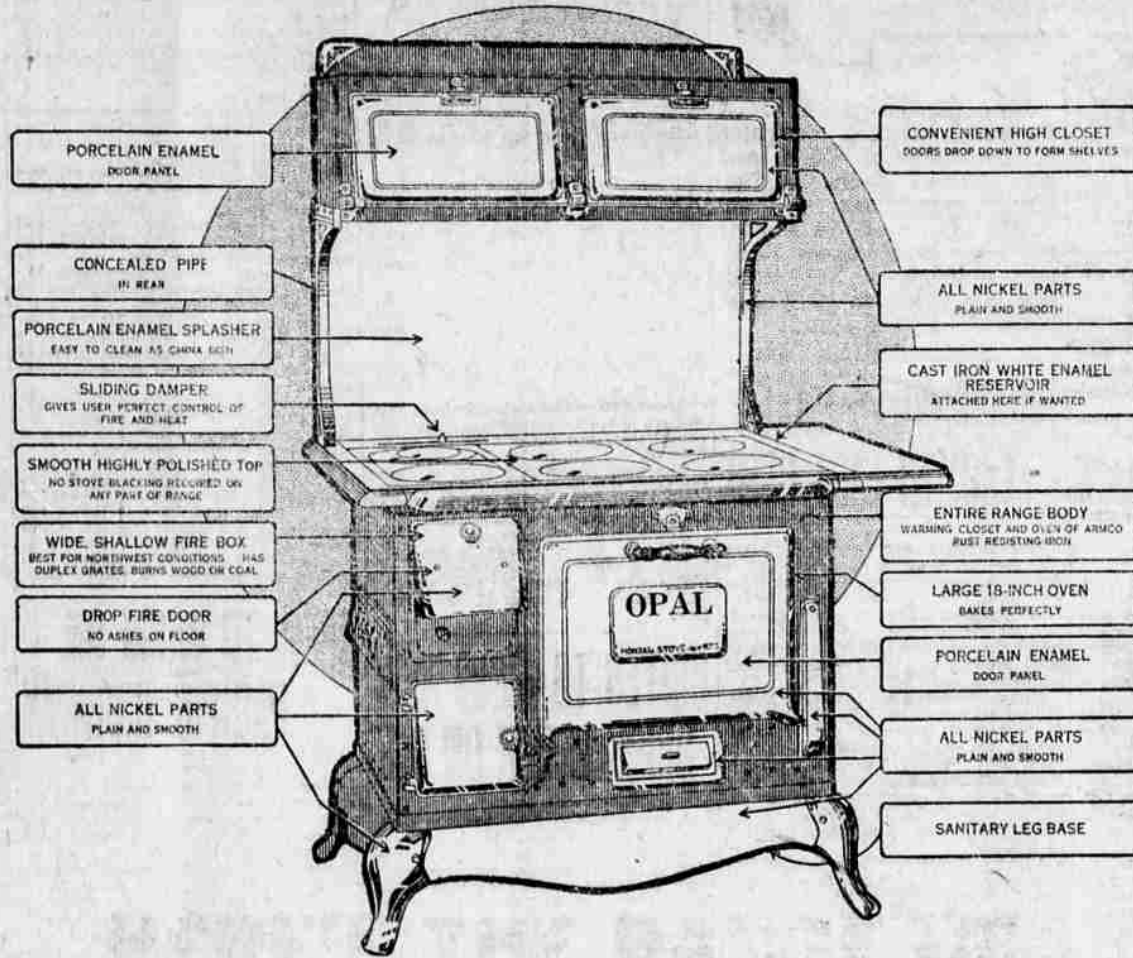
