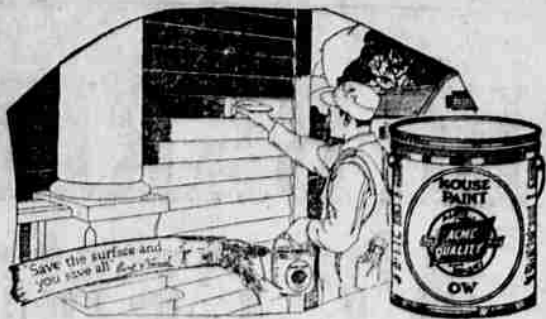

TIGERS MAY LAND IN FIRST DIVISION

With several promising young pitchers and the gaping infield hole filled with a capable looking shortstop, Ty Cobb, expects to land the Detroit Tigers in the first division. With a bunch of clouters that can average 310 the Tigers ought to do better if their inner defense and their box work improve. Emory Tiger, a rookie shortstop from Ft. Worth, who hit .252 and fielded like a young Wagner last season, will fill the hole at short which crippled the team last year. Even if he falls down, his work cannot be much worse than that of his predecessors. Johnson and Pillette, the \$40,000 pair from the Pacific coast league, are expected to be the pitchers that Cobb needed for all last summer. Johnson has terrific speed and fine control but not much experience. Pillette is a staid hurler, has seen a lot more work, but he hasn't the natural ability of Johnson. He, former Portland Beaver, who handled first base well last year, will be at the initial sack again this season.

Young is expected to get along better at second this season. Bobbie Jones is back at third.

As reserves for the inner works, Cobb has George Cutshaw, former pitcher; Fred Honey from Omaha, and Merritt, who worked relief last year.

The big bunch of the team is found in the outfield—Cobb, Heilmann and Veach, with Flagstad in reserve. The whole crew averages around .250.

Johnny Bassler and Woodall, who did all the work behind the bat last year, will attend to the catching.

Dutch Leonard, one of the main works of the pitching staff, still is holding out for \$15,000.

WILL OPEN MARKET THREE DAYS A WEEK

The new public market at Eighth and Park will be open for business Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, beginning next week, according to Will Ayres, market master. A charge of 25 cents a day is made for each stall. Maximum prices on staple goods are established by the market master each morning, protecting customers from possible overcharges.

The new building is 162 feet long and 30 feet wide and is divided into 54 stalls, six of which are screened-in for handling meat. A 10-foot alleyway extends lengthwise through the center of the structure, which has a cement floor and lattice-work walls. The stalls are divided by sloping platforms three feet wide. Counters of the same width extend in front of the stalls. The building, which was constructed by Stein brothers, cost a little less than \$3,000.

Funds for putting up the market building were collected by A. B. Gray, Carl Washburne, R. A. Baby and W. J. Hill, who started the subscription list with a combined donation of \$850. Other merchants gave large amounts, the J. C. Penney store, three blocks distant, contributing \$150. The local garage gave one-fifth of the total amount subscribed. Some of the other Eugene business men who were active in financing the new market were David Auld, R. B. Brunson, E. W. Merrill, J. F. Gert, C. J. Fulton, Fred Chambers, Stanley Stevenson and G. W. Griffin.

Although there was considerable opposition to the market when it was established by the Pomona Grange eight years ago, Eugene merchants and other business men are now practically a unit in supporting the institution. It has, according to its supporters, standardized products and stabilized prices, done away with annoying house-to-house peddling and enabled the farmers of Lane county to sell for cash approximately \$200,000 worth of products per year. Most of this money is spent in buying goods of local merchants, who are relieved of the work of handling an immense quantity of fruits, vegetables and other perishable products.

Although a great variety of farm products are sold at the market, vegetables constitute the bulk of the trade. One man sold 30 sacks of potatoes in a single day and another disposed of \$65 worth of strawberries in the same time. Export meat cutters are lured to cut and sell meat, being paid by the producers at time wages, or so much per animal.
