GALLI CURCI LOSING NO SLEEP OVER THEFT

San Diego, Cal., April 7.—Loss of jewelry worth from \$40,000 to \$75,000, according to estimates, did not interfere with the "beauty sleep" of Mme. Galli Curci, famous opera star today.

The madame slept late, in her apartment at the Grant hotel.

She had previously denied herself to all interviewers following the theft of her jewels yesterday afternoon at San Juan Capistrano.

Her accompanist-husband, Homer Samuels, said the jewels were partly covered by insurance but there are several pieces that were valued by Mme. Galli Curci far above their intrinsic value, as they were gifts to her from Queen Victoria of Spain.

Another small piece was the gift of Queen Maria Christina, mother of King Alfonso XIII.

"At least a half hour elapsed from the time the jewels were left in the room before they were missed by the party. In this time a number of persons had entered and left the room unnoticed by any of us. Any one of these persons could have picked up the case without knowing the value of its contents. When the finder learns its value I hope he will return it. As soon as I can confer with representatives of the insurance company it is likely that we will offer a substantial reward."

The jewels were in a jewel case, in custody of Mme. Galli Curci's maid, when they were stolen. The maid laid the case down in the women's rest room at a San Juan restaurant. A short time later she missed it, and the authorities were at once notified. The maid, Mrs. M. Hendrickson, said she noticed two young women, both blondes and well dressed, in the waiting room at the time she entered. The master key is the only one the officials have to work on.

L. E. Baymeyer, manager for the diva, said today that the value of the gems was "nearer \$100,000 than \$45,000."

New Lumber Orders In Excess of Production

Seattle, March 7.—One hundred and thirty mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending April 1st, manufactured 75,778,067 feet of lumber; sold 88,836,484 feet; and shipped 85,370,740 feet.

Production for mills reporting, was ten per cent below normal. New business for the week was 17 per cent above production. Shipments were 4 per cent below new business.

Thirty-one per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 27,188,484 feet, of which 19,908,096 feet will move coastwise or intercoastal; and 7,517,788 feet will move export. New business for delivery by rail amounted to 20,655 cars.

Forty per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 33,920,740 feet, of which domestic clearances accounted for 15,206,056 feet, and over-seas clearances, 18,714,684 feet. Total shipments amounted to 17,175 cars. Unfilled domestic cargo orders, total 70,482,934 feet; and unfilled export orders, 55,484,446 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders total 6607 cars.

The thirteen weeks' production was 1,001,206,824 feet; new business, 930,632,791 feet; and shipments 925,144,556 feet.

HURT IN AUTO CRASH

Seattle, April 7.—George H. Shaver, Seattle manager of a sewing machine company, was in a dying condition at a hospital today his wife was being cared for by neighbors near the scene of an auto accident in which Shaver's automobile was struck and overturned in a spectacular collision with a truck. The accident occurred near midnight. Shaver was caught beneath his automobile and his right side crushed and skull fractured.

POWERFUL MONEY GROUP IS PICTURED

Washington, April 7.—Big financial interests are back of the mine operators making them "powerful and arrogant enough to defy the government itself," in the present coal dispute, Representative Browne, Wisconsin, has charged.

He asserted that the railroads and the United States Steel corporation own 75 per cent of the coal mines of the country and that the railroads in turn are dominated by twelve large financial institutions.

Browne's charges have been placed before the house labor committee.

Browne charged that "a super-corporation" of financial interests dominates the industrial life of the country "through their control of the bank, or system, the railroads and the coal mines."

"A group of 25 men," Browne said, "control 82 per cent of the country's steam transportation system, operating 211,280 miles of railroad. These 25 men divide between themselves 193 directorships. They sit on the board of 99 Class 1 railroads."

Browne charged that the following financial institutions make up the "super corporation":

J. P. Morgan and company, First National Bank of New York; Equitable Trust company; Guaranty Trust company; Equitable Life Insurance association of the United States; Mutual Life Insurance company of New York; American Surety company; Mechanics and Metals National bank; National City Bank, National Surety company, New York Trust company, Chase National bank, United States Steel company.

Service People Celebrate Fifth Anniversary of War

Former soldiers, sailors and marines celebrated the fifth anniversary of the declaration of war last night in the armory at an entertainment and dance given under the auspices of Lane county post, American Legion. A large gathering of ex-service people was present.

Colonel George A. White, adjutant-general of Oregon, addressed the meeting on the welfare of the ex-service people. He also presented Captain M. B. Huxley with a medal for 25 years' service in the national guard. The dramatic class of the Eugene high school gave the one act skit "The Clod," which was well received. Several other musical numbers, dancing and refreshments made up the evening's entertainment.

WALKS TO REDUCE

Freemont, Neb., April 6.—Fatty Meeks, hiker and wrestler of Danville, Ill., passed through here late yesterday on his way from Danville to Hollywood, Cal., traveling on foot.

Meeks weighed 305 pounds at the start of his journey on February 24, and on arriving here had reduced that poundage to 280. The object of his hike is to reduce his weight to 200 pounds.

SEARCH FOR OPIUM

New York, April 7.—Hordes of contraband opium, valued at \$2,400,000 and involved in a huge drug smuggling conspiracy, were caught by federal authorities following raids last night in which arrests of suspected dope sellers were made.

Men already in custody are suspected of being members of a firm which imported 4000 pounds of gum opium valued at \$600 a pound.

BOHLER IS RE-ELECTED

The executive council Wednesday night re-elected George Bohler basketball coach for the coming year. Another action of the council was to slip \$7000 from the track budget. It was also voted to send Ralph Spearow to represent the university at the Penn State relay meet April 28.

Alleged Australia Forgers Held in New Orleans, La.

New Orleans, April 7.—Local authorities are awaiting requisition papers from Melbourne, Australia, for E. H. McBride and wife, Maibie, held here since March 24, on charges preferred by Australian authorities alleging forgeries.

The couple, according to detectives who made the arrests, is wanted in Australia on charges of having secured approximately 2,000 pounds in peace bonds through forgeries. The McBrides were apprehended after being traced from Australia to Vancouver, New York and finally to this city. They deny the charges, according to the police.

Small's Prosecutors Still After Bank Records in Case

Waukegan, Ill., April 7.—Prosecutors of Governor Len Small, charged with conspiracy to embezzle state funds, today continued their fight before Judge Claire Edwards to obtain all existing records of the First Trust and Savings bank of Kaukaee and the Grand Park Trust and Savings Bank.

Assistant Attorney General James H. Wilkerson resumed his examination of Norman Griffin, cashier of the Kaukaee institution, at the opening of the court.

GIRL SWALLOWS POISON

Nashville, Tenn., April 6.—Miss Mary Clark, 19, said to be of a prominent Massachusetts family, died here today from the effects of poison swallowed at her room in a local hotel last night. Miss Clark, police were told, came to Nashville about a week ago to meet a man from Los Angeles, said to have been her fiance. He failed to meet her, officers were informed.

MAY PLEAD NOT GUILTY

Port Orchard, Wash., April 7.—"Not guilty" will probably be the plea of Mrs. Ruth Plumley, confessed husband slayer, when the attractive young woman is again arraigned here next Tuesday.

Lillian Russell Urges Immigration Be Stopped

Washington, April 6.—Mrs. Alexander P. Moore (Lillian Russell) of Pittsburgh, who has been in Europe studying conditions at the request of President Harding, appeared before the immigration committee of the house today. She recommended chiefly:

- 1—Suspension of all immigration to this country for a period of one to five years.
- 2—Rigid examination of prospective immigrants before they leave their native countries.
- 3—Raising of requirements for immigrants, as regards their ability to read and speak English.

Band of Fifty Men Is Sought by Government

Camp Dix, April 6.—A band of fifty men, suspected of a plot to rob the government of immense stores of army equipment here, is sought by detectives. The band looted warehouses of \$200,000 worth of equipment.

MOTORCYCLIST KILLED

Bremerton, Wash., April 6.—Driving his new motorcycle for the first time down hill 40 miles an hour, Phillip Berger, 17, a navy yard messenger, crashed into an ammunition depot truck near here yesterday afternoon. He died at 8:30 today from jaws and knee caps broken and a fractured skull.
