For formal afternoon occasions there is a long tunic blouse of Spanish lace, with wrist length flowing sleeves plicated at the bottom.

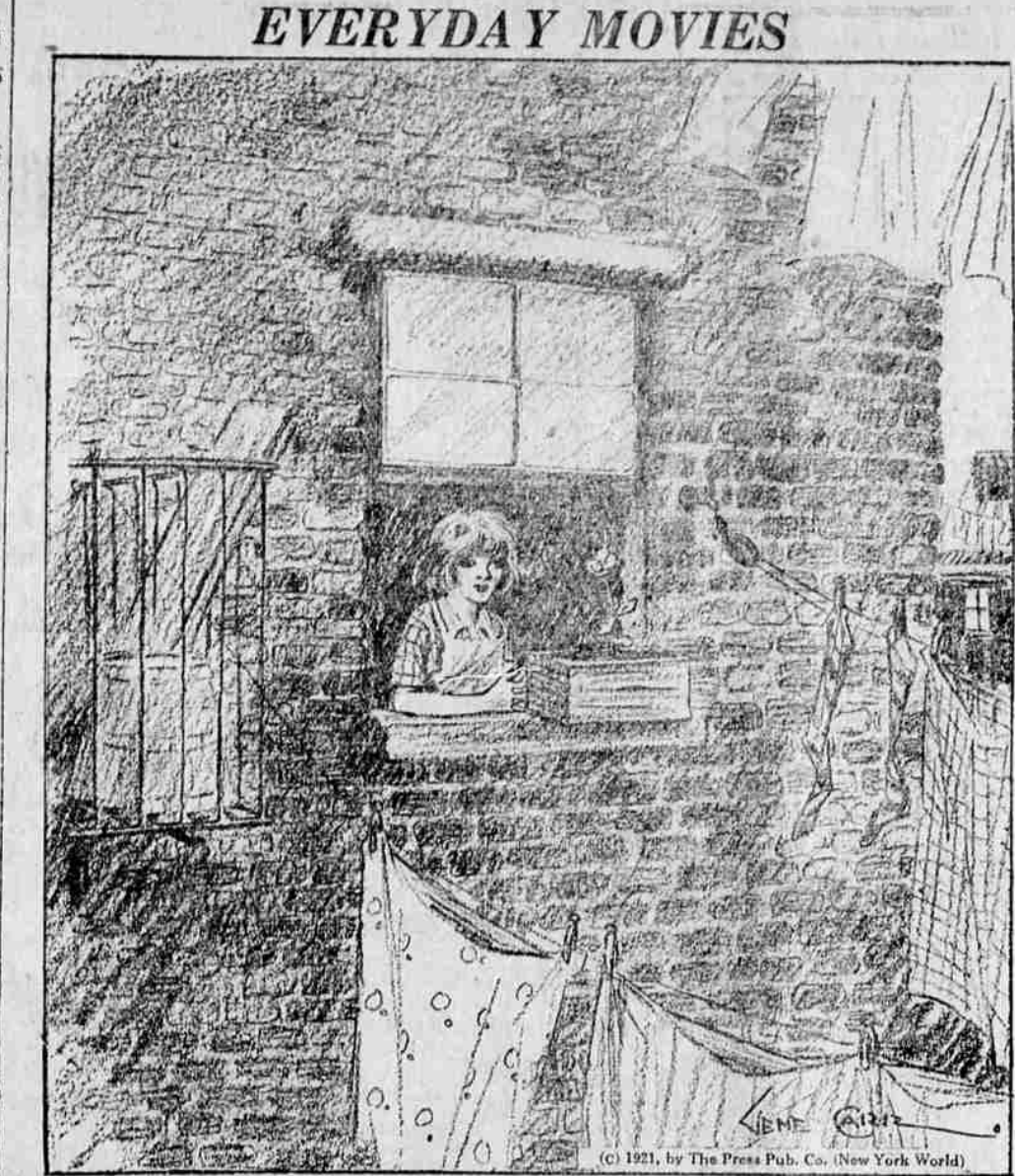

'PUT AND TAKE' FROM RELIGIOUS CUSTOMS

The game, "Put and Take," played with a tiny brass top, is more than two thousand years old, and in its present form is the outcome of a curious Jewish religious custom.

"Trendel," which is played on the Feast of Dedication. An ivory top is used, having four sides, each inscribed with a Hebrew letter. The four letters stand for all, half, nothing, and add. The game is not played for money, but the winner usually takes a bag of nuts or an equally simple prize.

The game was started because on the Feast of Dedication the Jews light special lamps—one on the first day, two on the second, and so on till the eighth. These lamps were not allowed to be used for reading or working, so "Put and Take" was instituted to while away the time.

Portland, April 13.—All grades of wheat were 1 cent higher yesterday on bids at the Merchants' Exchange session. The demand was limited and not much business was reported in the country.

Offers for white oats were 50 cents higher and corn was up 50c to \$1.44. Oats were unchanged. There was no demand for barley.

Eggs and Butter Firm

The egg market continued firm with an active demand from storage operators and prices unchanged.

There was also a good demand for cube butter at former quotations.

Poultry was firm with moderate receipts and dressed meats were quiet.

Sheep Are Lower

Most of the trading at the stockyards yesterday was in the sheep division. Spring lambs were quoted \$2 to \$3 lower on all grades with \$13 as the top price at present. Ewes were also listed lower at \$3 to \$7.50, with most sales at \$7.
