Special services are to be held at the Norwegian Lutheran church tonight and Friday night. This evening the Lord's supper service will be held at 7:30 o'clock, and tomorrow Good Friday services, with a reading of the passion history of Christ, will be held. There will also be a sermon tonight, when the services will be in Norwegian. Friday night the English tongue is to be used.

Contractor Lind Arrives—

Wending Meets Success—

That the poultry raisers meetings at Wending yesterday was well attended by people who have small home flocks, reports Ira P. Whitney, county agent. There were 12 raisers present at the afternoon meeting and 32 in the evening. The demand for eggs locally in Wending exceeds the supply, making poultry raising very profitable there. Under the direction of Arnold Collier, principal of the Wending school, a poultry club has been organized among the boys of the community.

Oregon-O. A. C. Debate Saturday—

The affirmative team of the University of Oregon women's debating squad will meet the O. A. C. team at 8:15 o'clock on Saturday evening at the Guild church while the negative team will debate with O. A. C.'s affirmative team in Corvallis. The subject, "Resolved that the principle of the closed shop should be adopted," is the question which the national O. A. C. debating society has been using this year, and is of national interest. Williams university vs. Redland university, and O. A. C. vs. University of Washington have already debated on this subject this year.

Infirmary Treats 7,584—

With a total of 7,584 treatments given during January, February and March of 1922, the University of Oregon health service in the three months of the winter took care of 78 per cent as many cases as were treated in the entire year preceding January 1, 1922. This enormous increase, according to Dr. John F. Bovard, director of the health service, is not due to the improvement in health conditions on the campus, but to the daily growing number of those who report at the slightest warning of cold, sore throat, eye trouble or minor injuries, so that infection may be warded off.

Methodists Baptize Tonight—

Between 25 and 30 new members are to be received into the Methodist church this evening by the pastor, Dr. J. M. Walters, who expects to also administer the rite of baptism to a number of converts. The latter will be given their choice of pouring, sprinkling or immersion. This service is usually held on the Sabbath, but on account of the church calendar being so crowded at this season of the year it was decided to receive new communicants during the week. Dr. Walters expresses himself as much pleased at the attendance at the past week services which are being held this week.

Inspect School Film—

A moving picture, "That Something," was shown at the Methodist church last evening for the benefit of the Parent-Teacher association and the school board, a large number of members of both bodies being present to witness the production, which the owners hope to show at the schools of Eugene. The picture illustrates how a young man who spent a good share of his time and money loafing around pool halls was rescued by his father to leave home and not return until he had made a place for himself in the world. "That something" which the youth needed was ambition. When this was instilled into his soul his own success and married a girl who had had a similar experience. The picture made an excellent impression on the committee, the members of which believe that it would inspire boys and girls to higher ideals and a determination to succeed by their own efforts.
