TOURIST PARK FEES TO START SATURDAY

The date for the commencing of the registration fee at the Eugene camp grounds has been set for Saturday, April 15, according to F. M. Wilkins, park commissioner. Automobiles have started coming through with loads of tourists and for several days many cars have been in the park, so the board has decided to start the registration fee.

The registration fee will be 50 cents for each automobile and will carry with it the privileges of the ground for 24 hours. After the first day in the park, the fee will be 25 cents for each 24 hours. Free water, wood and lights and the use of the tourist cottage is granted the visitors. The fees will be collected each evening and a registration book giving names, addresses, number in the party, destination, etc., will be kept.
