

### CHAMBER COMMITTEE TO ASK WITHDRAWAL OF RECALL PETITION

After speakers from various parts of the county had expressed their belief that the initiators of the proposed recall of the county road bonds could be induced to withdraw the petition, being circulated, the Eugene Chamber of Commerce passed unanimously resolutions opposed to the recall, at a meeting last night. A delegation of nearly a dozen from various business communities and several from other districts of the county were present at the meeting and presented the issue from their standpoint to the members of the chamber. The chamber also passed resolutions calling on the county court to go ahead with the road program.

### Committee is Appointed

A committee to confer with the initiators of the recall measure, which would make void the Eugene bonds of the \$2,000,000 road bonds voted in 1920, was appointed by President L. L. Ray of the chamber. This committee will present the matter from all the various angles as it affects different districts of the county to the persons initiating the recall in an effort to have the petitions withdrawn and the county saved the expense of a special election. The committee consists of Dr. William Kuckendall, David Graham, Fred Fink, L. E. Lee, Charles Stevens, Hans Petersen, James Winn and M. M. Boney.

### Resolution is as Follows

Following is the resolution in regard to the recall of the bonds: Whereas, an effort is being made to recall the unpaid portion of Lane county's \$2,000,000 bond issue, and Whereas, \$500,000 worth of said bonds have been sold for use on projects for which \$1,020,500 was originally set aside, and which sum it will take to complete said projects, and without the completion of which the amounts heretofore expended will be of little benefit, and Whereas, many of the projects provided for in the bond issue have received no attention whatsoever, and Whereas, agreements have been made between the Lane county court and the forest service and the federal government and the state highway commis-

sion which cannot be carried out without the use of bond money, and Whereas, the recall of the portion of the unpaid portion of these bonds would be manifestly unfair to a large portion of the county and especially the people in the more remote sections of the county, and Whereas, the men who are now actively engaged in instituting this recall are the same persons who were formerly opposed to the bond issue and do not represent the feeling of the business men of Eugene, and Whereas, we believe that the citizens and business men of Eugene desire to treat all parts of the county fairly and to have all sections of the county treated alike in receiving public money for road purposes.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Eugene Chamber of Commerce, that we are opposed to the initiative measure which proposes to prevent the further sale of Lane county's road bonds.

### SAWMILL STRIKE FAILS

Klamath Falls, Ore., April 13.—With the Wood Lumber company at Wood Falls, operating on an increasing scale each day, according to report from J. M. White, manager, it appears that the strike there is broken, and local operators today showed greater confidence in their ability to maintain their contention for a nine-hour day.

Following a day of testimony by operators before the conciliation board, Chairman Woodard at 5 o'clock this afternoon declared a recess, cleared the rooms of all six employees and employees, and recommended that they get together and seek to settle their own problems. Nothing leaked out as to progress made, but it was said at the close of more than an hour's conference that there was no definite agreement.
