EIGHT COUPLES ARE SEPARATED BY COURT

Eight decrees of divorce have been handed down by Judge G. F. Skipworth in circuit court during the last two days. Three decrees were granted to husbands and five to wives. Grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment predominated in the causes for action.

Henry Bauman was given a decree separating him from Ruby Bauman and was also given the care and custody of their minor children. He alleged that his wife gave birth to a child of whom he was not the father. The couple were married May 22, 1915, in Canada.

Charles Skinner was given a divorce from Nina May Skinner, on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. He also is given the custody of the minor children. The couple were married February 19, 1912.

Mrs. Martha L. Lake was granted a divorce from Alfred V. Lake on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married in Indiana, July 14, 1917.

Pearl B. Reynolds was given a divorce from Henry E. Reynolds, on cruel and inhuman treatment grounds. They were married in New York City in 1905.

Mrs. Emma Anker was granted a decree from John Anker and the care and custody of the children on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married in Redmond, Oregon, August 9, 1911.

J. Dell Liston was given a divorce from Mrs. Margaret J. Liston on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. The couple were married in Eugene in 1919.

Mrs. Alice Ales was granted a divorce from Charles M. Ales on grounds of cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married January 15, 1910.

Mrs. Hilda Moore was given a decree from Ray Moore after she had testified her husband associated with other women. They were married in April, 1921.

At the Condon School yesterday to Rev. Frank Fay Eddy addressed the

Parent-Teacher association on the problem of the sub-normal child. He related this particular problem to the larger one of the growing percentage of defectives in our modern society which he said would tend to be faced as citizens in the near future if our civilization endures.

As to the presence of the type of children who are mentally inadequate to meet the demands of our graded public

school system, he said we are face to face with a situation. There is nothing speculative about it. Such children, he said, he knew were in most of the schools.

The effect on both the child of defective faculties and upon the normal children was disastrous, when both were kept in the same rooms. The sub-normal child became embittered and an outcast among his fellows. The faculties he possessed were withered and his outlook on life became one of bewildered defiance. He tends to become either a napper or a petty criminal or in some cases, usually on account of strong and untrained sex impulses, a criminal of sinister type.

Such children are passed through the grades slowly. They become an incubus upon the teachers and create harmful associations with the pupils, usually younger than themselves, who are possessed of normal faculties.

With these facts staring us in the face, Mr. Eddy said there was but one practical thing to do and that was to provide, ungraded rooms, or at least ungraded schools properly equipped and with well-trained teachers for the salvaging of these sub-normal children. This solution was in use in many of the more progressive cities. He urged upon the association his consideration for Eugene.

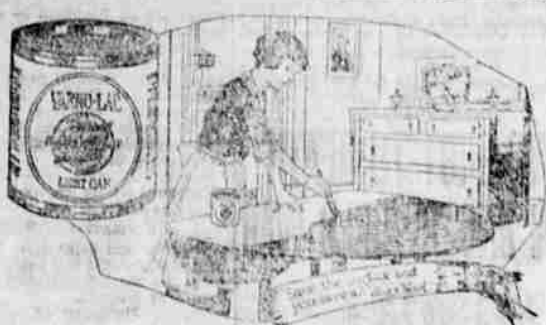
