PRIZE WINNING ESSAY ON CARE OF THE TEETH

The Oregon State Dental society has just concluded the county contests in a state essay contest in which the care of the teeth was the subject offered school children. Four prizes were awarded in Lane county: \$10 for the best from the fifth and sixth grades in Eugene and the same amount for the best from the same grades in schools outside the city, and \$10 for the best from the seventh and eighth grades in Eugene and the same amount for the best from the same grades in schools outside the city.

The following essay, written by Grace Burnett, of the sixth grade at Patterson school, Eugene, won the \$10 prize in its division:

THE TEETH AND THEIR RELATION TO GOOD HEALTH

We all know the great value of good health, but few realize the value of good teeth. To succeed in life we must have good health, and to have good health we must have good, sound teeth. This essay is to explain the relation between the teeth and health.

We have two sets of teeth; the temporary and permanent. The first of the temporary set generally appear by the end of the second year. They begin to fall out at the age of five or six, and the permanent teeth begin to appear. The six year molars are often mistaken for temporary teeth, but they are, truly permanent teeth.

If our baby teeth are decayed or missing, we cannot chew well to allow the jaw to spread, and an ill-shaped jaw and crooked, decayed, permanent teeth will follow. This shows that we should care for both sets of teeth equally well.

We should brush our teeth at least twice a day. Brush the upper teeth downward and the lower teeth upward. It is best to visit a dentist several times each year. Let him examine and clean your teeth. With the use of the X-ray he may find spots in the gums.

Besides regular brushing of the teeth we should give them proper use. We should eat hard bread, and other things which require vigorous chewing.

Bad teeth cannot always be prevented, even by the most scrupulous care. However we may prevent a great deal of pain and trouble by proper care.

NEW PACIFIC PRESIDENT

Portland, April 21.—A campaign to increase the usefulness of Pacific university and place it upon a more substantial basis, financially, will be outlined at a conference which will be held next week between W. C. Weir, newly elected president of the institution, and the board of trustees in Portland, probably next Wednesday.

Mr. Weir was elected president of Pacific university to succeed Dr. Robert Fry Clark at a meeting of the board of trustees of the school in Portland, on Wednesday. He previously had been conferred with relative to his election and had advised the trustees that he would accept.

Dr. Clark offered his resignation last June, on the ground that he preferred teaching and did not care to conduct a financial campaign such as was needed for Pacific university. At the request of the trustees he remained in charge until his successor could be selected.
