ALL FARMERS MAKE HASTE IN PLANTING WHILE SUN SHINES

Every tractor, horse and available piece of farm machinery and implement in Lane county is being worked to the limit by the farmers, who have started in great haste, since the sunshine broke forth a few days ago, to make up for a month's lost time. The farmer, the farmer's wife and children and the hired man are working long hours putting in the spring grain, planting garden and spraying the orchards, says Ira P. Whitney, county agricultural agent, who has taken a swing around the county during the last few days.

While the season is a month late and there is need to get seeds in the ground as soon as possible it is not predicted that crop prospects have been damaged. Good growing weather will make up for nearly all the lost time. Two weeks of sunshine now will find practically all the spring grain in the ground, in a seedbed full of moisture. Fall grain in most parts of the valley looks very good and Mr. Whitney reports that there is only a very small portion that has frozen out.

The planting of crop potatoes will start in a week or two and from the number of inquiries for seed potatoes and for methods of treating them received by the county agent, he predicts that there will be a large acreage put in this year. Mr. Whitney advises that when plant potatoes to treat them in a solution of four ounces of corrosive sublimate and 20 gallons of water. After the potatoes are treated two hours they are then taken out and cut for seed and then treated with kail plaster before being put in the ground.

The dormant spray is still being put on the orchards and the county agent strongly advises the following out of the spray program completely. He points out that those growers who followed the program last year experienced a yield of high class fruit while those who omitted a spray or two lost heavily in coils.

COAST SHELL TITLE IS AT STAKE TODAY

Seattle, Wash., April 21.—With the Washington and California varsity crews waiting for the word to start the race that will determine the western rowing championship for another year, interest in water racing enthusiasts is centered upon Lake Washington today.

Washington is the favorite but the southern hopes have been raised by the last minute announcement that Dan McMillen, captain and stroke of the Bruin eight, has recovered from recent injury, and will be in the southern shell. Ben Wallace, California coach, is pessimistic regarding the outcome. Coach Ed Leader, Washington and his men are confident but they fully realize that the strength of the southern crew is unknown and the race may be grimly contested.

It is generally recognized by all who have seen the trials of the crews that this year will see the strongest teams that ever raced in the western contest. With the sun shining, the smoke curling straight up and the sky bright, rowing conditions are ideal. It is not unlikely that a new course record may be set.
