### KLEPPER WOULD SHOULDER BLAME

Seattle, April 21.—William Kenworthy is entirely free of any intentional or actual wrongdoing. He is being made the goat by the national board. If any blame is to be shouldered, it is mine and I am willing to do so.

So said William H. Klepper, president of the Portland coast league ball club, in discussing the latest turn in the case of the "Iron Duke."

Kenworthy's contract with the Seattle club, which was in effect while Klepper was president of the Seattle team in 1921, stipulated that in case Kenworthy and the Seattle team could not agree on terms making Kenworthy playing manager, that automatically he would become a free agent and it was on this understanding that Klepper signed the disputed player after Portland and Seattle switched managers. Klepper said:

"After Landis accused the Portland club of tampering with Kenworthy and declared him a Seattle player I advised Kenworthy to hold off." Klepper continued, "Then to settle all difficulties I obtained Kenworthy's release from Seattle by trading Marty Krug for him. Seattle sold Krug at a good figure and now Kenworthy and both the Seattle and Portland clubs are fully satisfied. Yet Landis will not permit one of the summer stars in the National game to play. ### TENDLER CLAIMING LIGHTWEIGHT TITLE

Henry Leonard, on the books as the best of the 125 pounders, is still around and all that, but he seems to have lost the decision on the telegraph wires.

Leonard dislikes Tandler so much that he won't even fight with him and it is a safe bet that he won't counter the verbal sleep producers of his quacktown rival.

**Tandler Angry at Leonard.** Tandler is good and mad because Leonard failed to include him in the list of invitations that were sent out to help him sell his bank roll at Michigan City next July.

He says some mean things about the bad thumb that Leonard has developed several times when a promoter was about to get him in the ring and he goes so far as to openly assert that Leonard is afraid of him.

Tandler is a victim of the aloof attitude that the United States has taken regarding the International Boxing Federation. If Uncle Sam would join the arena, European body which is running the fight business, Lew could claim the title and grab the crown with a few vicious words.

He might not get the title but he would have some fun in the attempt, an Eugene Criegi, the French featherweight champion, did recently in Paris.

Arthur Wynns, a Belgian, holds the European featherweight title and it seems that he won't fight Criegi.

### Criegi Claimed Title

The Frenchman, following the letter of international law, challenged Wynns six months ago and when six months had rolled around without getting any response, Criegi went to a newspaper office, weighed in and went to an empty boxing arena that night.

When the managements came around and Wynns had not appeared Criegi claimed the title.

Wynns protested that he didn't know anything about it and Criegi was revealed upon by his friends to give the title back to the Belgian after he had won his moral victory.

If Leonard had won his title under the New York rules, Tandler could get some place with a claim for default, as the Walker law requires that a champion winning a title under its rules must defend his title once every six months when he is challenged by a bona fide contender.
