CHICAGO GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, April 28.—Grain prices closed higher on the Chicago board of trade today. The advance was due largely to an exceptionally brisk export demand for wheat. Sales of wheat for shipment to Europe was estimated at 2,500,000 bushels. The buying was an unfavored crop prospects in European countries especially France.

Provisions were higher. May wheat opened off 3-8 at \$1.40 3-4 and closed up 1-8; July opened down 3-8 at \$1.25 7-8 and closed up 3-8. September opened off 1-2 at \$1.18 and closed up 1-2.

May corn opened off 1-4 at 60 1-2 and closed up 7-8. July opened off 1-8 and closed up 7-8.
