CHAMBER RECEIVES NUMEROUS INQUIRIES

That many letters are being received inquiring about the Chamber, its history, its activities and its future, is shown by the numerous inquiries received by the Chamber of Commerce since its opening on May 1.

The Chamber in addition to regular routine work has been very busy during the last few weeks preparing the new publications authorized in the 1922 budget. "The Heart of Oregon's Outdoors," "Lane County's Industrial Survey," "Lane County's Agricultural Opportunities," "Travel," and a tourist road map of Lane County.

The Chamber of Commerce has given attention and support to the following recommendations during the month of April:

"Endorsed the farmers' creditors \$20,000 stock sale to Eugene people, making possible the immediate erection of their own creamery."

"Called a special chamber meeting for a general discussion of the proposed recall of the \$2,000,000 bond issue for Lane County. The results showed the people generally opposed to a recall."

"Interpreted the Chamber of Commerce secretary of the state, who were in Eugene for the short course at the University, establishing a closer relationship with the various chambers of the state."

"Authored figures and statistics from the various states with reference to the tax situation which were compiled and read at the last monthly meeting. The report showed the tax situation to be about on the same general basis the country over."

"Called board of directors to advise with entertainment committee, assisting them with their state conventions to be held in Eugene this month. Discussions favoring the adoption of President Harding's policy for adequate military and naval protection was also heard and supported."

RIGHT OF LIMITING BONUS IS ATTACKED

Salem, May 1.—A test case to determine whether the state bonus commission has authority to reduce a bonus loan below 75 per cent of the appraised value of property offered for security, when the amount sought in the loan does not exceed \$30,000, was filed in the circuit court here Saturday.

The case is a mandamus proceeding to compel the commission to approve an application for a loan of \$2170, sought by Edwin Stevens Woodford upon real estate located just south of Salem in Marion county. The \$2170, it is pointed out in the complaint, represents 75 per cent of the \$2908, at which Woodford's property had been appraised by M. D. Leabo, G. W. Johnson Jr., and Phillip Gilbert, the three appraisers named by the commission for Marion county. The commission, according to the complaint, is exceeding what it is entitled to be its right in extending loans to ex-servicemen under the state bonus law, had tendered Woodford a loan of but \$1600 on his property.

This, Woodford contends, is insufficient to enable him to pay off the mortgage on the property, which he recently purchased on the strength of the bonus loan, nor will it permit him to remodel the house on the property to make it habitable.

Woodford is represented in the action by Roy Shields, Brazier Small and Robin A. Day, attorneys retained by Capital Post No. 9, American Legion, to test out this angle of the bonus law, which has been a source of much controversy between applicants for loans and the bonus commission.
