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BESIDES NOMINATING, VOTERS WILL DECIDE FOUR SPECIAL ISSUES

Besides voting for the nomination of candidates on their respective tickets, republicans and democrats alike will go to the polls in the 100 precincts of Lane county Friday, May 19, to express their desires on three special election ballots—the recall of Fred Williams, Oregon public service commissioner-at-large, the recall of Fred G. Buchtel, public service commissioner for the western Oregon district, and the authorization for the purchase of the Lane county fair grounds. In Eugene the electors will also vote on a charter amendment authorizing the city council to issue and sell \$20,000 worth of street improvement bonds, making four different questions for local voters.

G. O. P. Ballot Heavy One.
The republican ballot is crammed full of candidates, every office being contested except that of superintendent of public instruction, circuit court judge, and joint-senator for Lane and Lane counties. The democratic ballot is slimmer and shorter. The only contest which the followers of Jackson and Jefferson will have to decide are for governor and democratic national committee.

As to the qualifications of candidates and their platforms from what is printed after their names it will be hard to judge. Three-fourths of the candidates for governor and the state legislature promise tax reductions in one form or another, many believe in "defending the home" driving the "corporations out of

politics" and "American business administration."

Eugene voters on entering the polls will be handed five ballots. The recall of Commissioner Williams and Buchtel are voted on separately.

Would Give Court Power.
The resolution of the county court to be voted on provides for the purchase of the Lane county fair grounds for \$20,000 and to invest in the county court power to include in the 1923 tax levy a sufficient fund to make payment thereof.

The Eugene charter amendment to be voted on provides for the issue and sale of \$20,000 of street improvement bonds to draw six per cent interest and mature in 15 years. These bonds are necessary before any more streets are paved in Eugene as the property owners pay for the street frontage and not for intersections.

Spokane School Children Not So Bad, Jury Reports

Spokane, Wash., May 13.—Recommendations that the state assume control of roadhouses and country dance halls featured the report of the grand jury appointed to probe alleged immoral conditions existing in Spokane high schools.

The grand jury started its probe following charges brought by Judge R. M. Webster that flagrant evidence of immorality had been observed among high school students.

The jury found that intoxication was the sole basis for any charge of immorality, and this was among a very small percentage of students.

The vast majority are above reproach, the report said. No evidence of the use of narcotic drugs among students was obtained.

Indifference of parents toward their children's activities was cited by the grand jury as an important contributory factor to the possible spread of immorality. Lack of discipline in the homes, lack of chaperonage in automobile parties and entertainments, and at road houses, dance halls, "nozzle joints," cafes and parks were cited as serious branches of care on the part of parents.

The grand jury censured particularly high school fraternities, fancy dancing at school entertainments, and school style shows as extravagant and undemocratic.

Oregon Would Have Band Of Mountain Goats Back

Portland, Ore., May 13.—Warrants for the arrest and papers for the extradition of 16 mountain sheep, two sons of the best herd left in the state, were forwarded to the governor of Idaho Friday by the Oregon state game commission. Bad weather in Wallawa county, where the sheep wintered on the range, is given as the reason for the sheep swimming the Snake river and transferring their citizenship to the state of Idaho.

State Game Warden Brown expressed anxiety to regain possession of the sheep because the band of 50 left in the state is nearly half the total number of mountain sheep left in the United States, the old guard of a once numerous spe-

TIMELY RECIPES FOR HOUSEWIFE

Quick Health Bread.
One and one-half cups white flour, one cup cornmeal, one-half cup bran, six teaspoons baking powder, one teaspoon salt, one and one-half cups milk, two tablespoons butter, one egg. Sift cornmeal, flour, salt and baking powder together. Add bran and stir thoroughly, adding all the moisture, then shortening, beating all the time. Turn into well-greased bread tin and bake in a moderate oven forty minutes.

Dutch Apple Cake.
Two cups flour, four tablespoons baking powder, one-fourth cup sugar, one cup milk to make batter, speck of salt, two tablespoons butter, one egg, vanilla. Mix and sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Chop in the fat, add egg well beaten and milk. Spread in a buttered baking pan and place sliced apples on top. Sprinkle with sugar, cinnamon and finely chopped nuts and bake one-half hour. Spread with beaten white of egg sweetened, and brown slightly. Serve warm.

Fruit Croquettes.
Two cups cold fish, one cup milk, one teaspoon salt, one cup bread crumbs, two tablespoons flour, two tablespoons butter, one-half teaspoon pepper, two eggs, parsley, fat, lemons. Cream flour and butter. Put milk in double boiler and when at the boiling point add flour and butter. Stir until smooth and thick, add salt, pepper and fish, flaked. Spread on a platter and let cool. Shape, roll in flour, egg and crumbs, then fry in deep fat. Arrange on hot dish, garnish with parsley and sliced lemon. This will serve six persons.

Sweet Potato Biscuits.
Two cups flour, one cup buttermilk, one tablespoon sugar, one-half teaspoon soda, one cup mashed sweet potatoes, one teaspoon salt, one tablespoon butter. Mash the boiled sweet potatoes smooth, add the sugar, then the butter. Dissolve the soda in the buttermilk and add it. Sift flour and salt and add to mixture. Roll out, cut as other biscuits and bake in a quick oven. This will make about two dozen biscuits.

English Fig Pudding.
Chop eight ounces dried figs fine, add six ounces finely chopped suet, four ounces bread crumbs, four ounces flour, four ounces sugar, pinch of salt, pinch nutmeg; mix well. Beat two eggs, add half-pint milk; add to mixture and stir well. Pour into well-greased bowl and steam two and a half hours. Serve with any nice pudding sauce.

Virginia Lemon Pie.
Yolks of six eggs, one cup sugar, rind and juice of one and one-half fair sized lemons. Cook in a double boiler as far as custard remove from the stove and allow it to get cold; beat the whites of six eggs to a stiff froth and fold half of it, not beat it, into the cold custard; place in the oven until brown and then put the

remaining froth on top; again put in the oven and brown.

Tomato Jelly Salad.
One cup strained canned tomatoes or tomato sauce, one cup hot water, one bouillon cube, piece of bay leaf, one-half teaspoon salt, one onion grated, two tablespoons gelatine soaked in one-half cup cold water.

Add the bouillon cube, onion, bay leaf and salt water and simmer ten minutes; strain; add gelatine and stir until dissolved. Then add tomato and one cup of

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Wins Trip to Boston For Attending Church

T. J. Edlinho, of the school of business administration of the University of Oregon, president of the Eugene chapter of the Unitarian Laymen's league, has been notified that the First Unitarian church stands fourth in its class in the church attendance record carried on during the winter by the league, and is invited to name a delegate to attend the Unitarian Anniversary Week meetings in Boston at the expense of the league. The meetings open Sunday, May 21.

The church attendance record has been one of the contributions of the Laymen's league to the Unitarian religious and educational campaign. Since last fall records have been kept by 200 chapters in 30 states and three Canadian provinces. Tabulation at the end of six months reveals the widespread stimulation created by the plan, slightly more than one-half the records showing large increases. The greatest percentage of gain was made in the churches which already had the largest congregations.

Along similar lines, in an Easter and Easter campaign to increase church membership, the first 228 churches reporting added an average of 35 persons per church.

The local representative of the Laymen's league will have entree to all sessions at Anniversary Week and will hear final reports on the join-the-church campaign, the church attendance record and the increase in influence of Unitarianism in Great Britain, Japan, Holland, Italy and Czech-Slovakia. These are phases

of church work which will receive special emphasis at this year's meeting, in contrast with the reports last year on the successful financial canvass under the leadership of Chief Justice William Howard Taft when approximately \$2,400,000 was raised for the first religious and educational campaign in the history of the Unitarian church.
