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LORANE STOCKMEN TO BUY PUREBRED BULLS

To inspect a number of Shorthorn bulls a delegation of Lorane-Crow cattle-men, headed by Ira P. Whitney, county agricultural agent, and Cal Young, county livestock project leader, will visit Albany and points in Linn county next Thursday. There is a demand for six or seven purebred Shorthorn bulls in the Lorane-Crow vicinity since the organization of the cattle raisers' association there.

Two or three Shorthorn bulls in Lane county are now being considered for purchase. Eugene business men have subscribed a fund sufficient to buy one bull which they will present to the Lorane-Crow Cattle Raisers' association. It is partly to select this animal that the trip will be made to Linn county, according to Mr. Whitney.

The Lorane-Crow district is now organized and it is contrary to law to turn out any but purebred bulls on the range. This is one of the biggest range districts in the country and consequently several purebred bulls are in demand.

As the World Wags!

CLEANING UP Eugene seems to not steal the name but we can show the mean collecting the tin cans and old pieces of junk from cellars and basements, placing said refuse on the curb laws. If there is such, and waiting for the wagons of the street department to come along and pick it up. No doubt many dark places get at this time a much needed going over. Still it is something of a joke when described as a civic clean-up campaign.

NATURE is lavish in this region. Trees and shrubbery and plants respond magically to cultivation and care. In justice to a great many home-owners in the city it is to be said that their lawns and roses and flower-beds do them much credit. Just about half the homes in the city are attractive. But the other half are deplorable. Is it not a fact?

WE NEED some plan which goes further than an annual shout about clean-up week followed by fifty-one weeks of forgetfulness. But when one tries to frame up something in the way of practical remedies, he is perplexed. Like all would-be reformers, he is apt to fall back on the over-worked word, education. Because there are some thousands of home-owners who are cherishing some ideal of home-making which has a regard for beautiful surroundings, we have a city which is very attractive in spots. If there were some way of getting that ideal into the minds of renters and owners of property which is either vacant or rented, we would have a permanent solution and the possibility of some concerted action on the part of all of us could be easily carried through.

A VALUABLE method of educating the community along these lines is to adopt some civic object and make a slogan about it. The mere designation of Portland as the "Rose City" has done much to inspire property owners to plant and care for roses in every vacant nook and corner. Roses grow in Eugene as well as in Portland. We cannot

enforce certain reasonable ordinances relating to such property requiring the wrecking and removal of ramshackle buildings, appropriating for public use in a limited way vacant lots of the character mentioned and putting in force some cheap way of redeeming them from unsightliness. But after all is done and said, the only solution which will work permanently is the building a sense of the artistic and beautiful in human souls. It is a long process, but entirely worth while.

ORDINANCES by the city government cannot do much in a matter of this kind. But there are some things that might be required by law. There is a zone ringing the business section of town where property is too close in to be attractive for residence purposes, unless it be for apartment house sites. It is too far out for business blocks at present and consequently the owners seem to be holding it for investment. It is either vacant or occupied by unsightly old buildings, neglected and ramshackle. The Y. M. C. A. building for instance, is completely surrounded by a waste of desolation and across the street a half a block of land with the gaunt bones of an old church foundation showing through the rubbish, with a central pile in the shape of an old furnace in the center, flanked by a sign of billboards in the rear, and said billboards in comparison with the general scene look quite beautiful. If the grounds around the Y. M. C. A. were made attractive, and the vacant property across the way were made park-like, if it were only to make it a green lawn, the corner which has the city hall and public library, both attractive buildings, on the other intersections, would be a credit to the city. This is just one illustration of what is needed in this zone waste and ruins surrounding the central business sections of the town.

LUMBER, HIDE AND HOP RATES REDUCED

Trans-continental rates on lumber and building materials, hops, green hides and wire fence materials are announced to become effective at once by the Southern Pacific company today.

Hops in less than carload lots from the Pacific coast to Chicago and territory west will be reduced from \$1.75 to \$2.20 per 100 lbs. Rates on cabbage in carloads from Oregon and Washington to Chicago and points west will be reduced from \$1.40 to \$1.10 per 100 lbs. and to Colorado from \$1.41 to \$1.06 per 100 lbs. Rates on lumber and shingles from Oregon and Washington will be stationary on the A. T. & S. P. in New Mexico as named in the trans-continental lumber tariff will receive reductions ranging from 5 to 10 per cent. Rate on roofing slate from Chicago to the Pacific coast will be reduced from \$1.83 to \$1.08 per 100 lbs. and from the Pennsylvania slate district from \$1.92 to \$1.53 per 100 lbs. Other commodities which are to receive substantial reductions are chain castings, green salted hides and wire fence material such as steel fence bands, clamps, iron and steel post tops, band iron, etc. Corresponding reductions will be made from and to territory east of Chicago provided concurrence of eastern lines is secured.

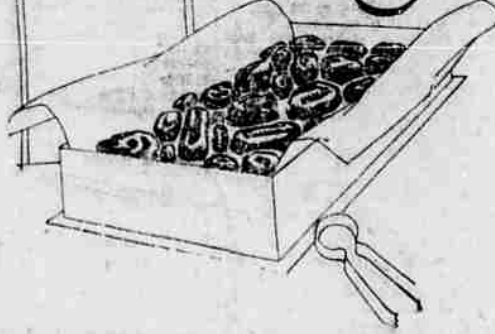
