The churches of Eugene will observe Mothers' Day tomorrow with beautiful and appropriate services. Bruce J. Giffin, student pastor, has chosen "Our Mothers" as the subject for his discourse at the morning service at the Central Presbyterian church, which begins at 10 o'clock. Typic organ music of special significance will be rendered by Professor Conn. The vocal numbers include "My Mother's Prayer," by a quartet and a solo, "Queen of the Earth—Mother," by John R. Siefert, tenor.

OREGON FROSH ARE WINNERS IN TRACK MEET ON HAYWARD

By showing superior ability in the dashes and hurdle races the University of Oregon freshmen walked away with the honors in the triangular meet with Chemawa Indian school and Washington high of Portland held on Hayward field this morning. Oregon amassed a total of 67 points, Washington 40, and Chemawa 18.

The Portland high school athletes, who are under the tutelage of Vera Windham, former Oregon star, gave the frosh stiff competition in all the sinder events and took firsts in both the distance races. Hunt of Oregon with first place in both hurdle events, and Keating of Washington high, who took both in the mile and the half mile, tied for high point honors with 10 each. The closest event of the meet was the 220-yard low hurdles in which Hunt of the freshmen nosed out Rodda of Washington by a hair. No exceptional time was noted. The respective events and their winners were:

100-yard dash—Brookey (Oregon), first; Gooley (Washington), second; Thomas (Chemawa), third. Time 19.3 seconds.

Mile run—Keating (Washington), first; Preston (Washington), second; Allen (Oregon), third. Time 4:40 minutes.

Shot put—Nix (Chemawa), first; Liebe (Washington), second; Snear (Oregon), third. Distance, 44 feet, 10 inches.

440-yard dash—Hardenburg (Oregon), first; Carberg (Washington), second; O'Connor (Washington), third. Time 53 seconds.

Discus—Liebe (Washington), first; Nix (Chemawa), second; Tergenson (Oregon), third. Distance, 101 feet, 11 inches.

High jump—Hodges (Washington) and Brookey (Oregon) tied for first; Gallagher (Oregon) third. Height, 5 feet 2 inches.

120-yard high hurdles—Hunt (Oregon), first; Brookey (Oregon) second; other entries disqualified. Time, 17.4 seconds.

Pole vault—Worthing (Oregon) and Lander (Washington) tied for first; Evans (Chemawa) third. Height, 10 feet, 8 inches.

220-yard dash—Brookey (Oregon), first; Carruthers (Oregon) second; Winslow (Washington) third. Time, 23.2 seconds.

220-yard low hurdles—Hunt (Oregon), first; Rodda (Washington) second; Liebe (Washington), third. Time, 27.1 seconds.

Broad jump—Penna (Chemawa), first; Curry (Oregon), second; Spear (Oregon) third. Distance, 19 feet and 7 1/2 inches.

Half mile—Keating (Washington), first; Curry (Oregon), second; Brook (Oregon) third. Time, 2:05.

Javelin—Brocker (Oregon), first; Allen (Oregon), second; Snear (Oregon) third. Distance, 132 feet 10 inches.

Half-mile relay—Oregon, first; Washington, second; Chemawa, third.

The Frosh dropped the second game of the two played here with the O. A. C. Rooks this week-end Saturday morning by the score of 8 to 1. The game of Frosh was also won by the visitors by a 7 to 3 count. The loss of the second game was attributed to the errors made by Coach Huntington's proteges, as they made eight, every one of which was costly.

The Frosh started out well by securing a run in the first frame, and held the lead with this till the last of the second, when the Rooks succeeded in getting one across.

The fifth frame seems to be the disastrous one for the Frosh in every game, for in Friday's game the Rooks garnered four runs in that canto, and in the last contest put over five before they were retried, thus taking a free run lead and practically secured up the game.

The Frosh did not live up their reputation being a team of hard hitters, for in both games they succumbed easily to the Rook twirlers, often going out in one, two, three order. Newbill, the twirler in the first game struck out 18 of the Rook hitters, while Street, who pitched Saturday morning did nearly as good, for he fanned 12 during the game.

Skinner pitched for the Frosh, and except for the costly errors made by his teammates should have won the game. The Rook hitters were connecting in fine shape though, and the hitting of Shortstop Ridings was especially noticeable, as in four times at bat he secured four hits.

Inter Class—Intercollegiate athletics, standardization of the point system in transfers, eligibility, meeting of awards by women athletes, standardization of swimming meets, and methods of financing women's athletics in the various colleges were the main points of discussion at the closed session of the Western Athletic Association of American college women this morning in the Woman's building.

Intercollegiate varsity competition was the center of much lively debate and it was finally resolved to discontinue such competition between colleges and that any college failing to live up to the rules of the conference should be dropped from the western conference.

Inter-class, intercollegiate games will be sanctioned by the conference. That is, each of the four classes of a school may play the similar class of another college if situated close enough so that competition can be had at a minimum expense. Miss Grace Allen, California delegate brought out the point that inter-class intercollegiate competition gave more girls a chance to take part in all variety games in which not more than ten or eleven could compete.
