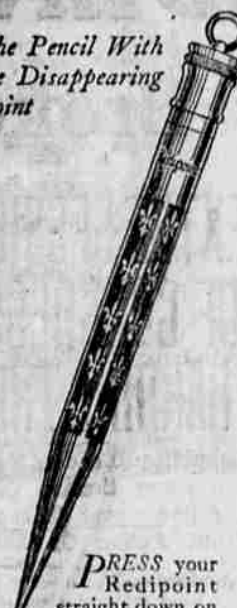

SUMMER SESSION AT UNIVERSITY TO OPEN ON JUNE 19TH

With more than 350 students registering in 85 courses, with 37 instructors, the Eugene session of the University of Oregon summer term will open June 19. A large percentage of those attending are teachers, and about thirty superintendents and principals of Oregon schools are expected. Many well known educators will serve on the faculty. Dr. C. Pratt, superintendent of Spokane city schools and formerly head of the department of education at DePauw university, will offer courses in high school problems and organization of city schools. Professor E. E. Lindsay of the University of Iowa, who has had experience as a city school superintendent, and has written extensively for educational journals. The remainder of the faculty will be made up of instructors from Princeton, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Minnesota, Columbia, Idaho, Toronto and Oregon universities.

Y. M. Covers Housing.
The campus Y. M. C. A. has taken charge of the housing situation, and lists are being compiled of available places for board and room. Light, housekeeping rooms, apartments, and small furnished houses. Friendly and Susan Campbell, men's and women's residence halls on the campus, will provide board and room for \$5 per week, and board alone for \$3.

The University health service will be at the disposal of the summer term students. The hospital will be closed during the summer, but the dispensary will be open throughout the session.

An opportunity will be given Professor Reddie's dramatization class to present a popular play at the end of the term, and Professor George Turnbull's class in journalism will again publish the Summer Sun, a daily newspaper of college news.

Many Speakers for Assemblies.

It is hoped that assemblies may be held daily, and the following speakers have already agreed to lecture at this hour. Dr. S. B. Harding, Minnesota; Dr. J. D. Spaulding, Princeton; Dr. E. T. Devine, associate editor of the Survey; Rabbi Samuel Kosh, Seattle; Dr. R. M. Wender, Michigan; Otis Richardson, Ida; Superintendent O. C. Pratt, of Spokane city schools; State Superintendent J. A. Churchill; P. L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon; Dr. Edmund S. Conklin, Dead Center, Oregon; and Earl Kirkpatrick of the University of Oregon.

Courses are offered in the following departments: botany and bacteriology, chemistry, drama and the speech arts, economics, education, English, geology, government, history, journalism, library methods, mathematics, music, physical education, physics, psychology, political science, romance languages, and sociology.

Eastern Rotary Club Special Trains Pass Through Eugene

Three Rotary club trains passed through Eugene today from the International Rotary convention in Los Angeles and three others will pass through on Wednesday and Thursday. Among the Rotarians coming home by the northern route are the Cleveland, Toledo, Boston, New York and Philadelphia district groups.

Fifteen Shrine specials went over the Portland division for San Francisco on Sunday and 22 are scheduled to return over the division this week-end, according to F. G. Lewis, traveling passenger agent of the Southern Pacific who checks the south bound trains at Ashland.

Both the Rotarians and Shriners expressed themselves as pleased with the appearance of Oregon towns and the prosperous looking countryside, says Mr. Lewis.

Jewish Midshipman Claims Academy Book Insults Him

Washington June 13.—A scathing denunciation of all policies in the United States naval academy discipline which allowed discrimination against a midshipman of Jewish extraction was made in the senate today by Senator Sutherland, republican, W. Va. Sutherland announced he would make an investigation to find out what extent authorities at the academy were responsible for mistreatment of Leonard Kaplan, West Virginia student, who said he was "insulted" in the class year book.

Senator Sutherland declared he would address a message to President Harding asking that the affair be investigated.

Fine Prune Prospects In Willamette Valley

Salem, June 23.—L. D. Scarborough of Creswell reports a very large tonnage of prunes this year, which he estimates to reach between 300 and 400 tons. The prune situation throughout the Willamette valley is very satisfactory and growers believe that in most cases there will be a heavy crop.

At a regular meeting of the board of directors of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association authority was given the committee on dried fruit and the dried fruit sales department to make arrangements for at least a fifty per cent advance on the 1922 opening prices of prunes to be given to growers upon delivery to the packing house or upon being graded. This insures the growers of a good substantial payment at the beginning of the season.

Canning Now Underway.

Canning is being done by the Oregon Growers Cooperative association beginning this week at the Salem dried fruit packing plant, which has been remodeled to accommodate machinery for a two line operation. The capacity, it is stated, will be about five tons of fresh fruit per day, and the season's output will be between seventy and eighty thousand cases.

C. J. Pugh in charge of canning operations is endeavoring to make the association's pack stand for quality. It is expected that as the canned fruit put up by the association becomes better known in eastern markets that the present capacity will be greatly increased.

It is reported in a recent communication from a Philadelphia representative who had opened a pack of number ten water grade apples before a group of wholesale grocers that without exception it was declared to be the best pack they had ever seen.

By putting up quality fruit in this manner, it is believed a large tonnage of fresh fruit will be saved yearly that could not otherwise be handled.

Spray Apples This Week.

It is advised by the field experts of the association, as well as the state experiment station that the 30 day spray should be put on apples during this week as moths are flying about now and will soon be depositing eggs. This spray should be combined with the regular scab spray and lead arsenate should be added at the rate of two pounds per 100 gallons of water.

If the presence of the cherry fruit maggot is noticed, it is advisable to spray with poisoned bait composed of calcium arsenate, one-half pound, molasses two quarts to eight gallons of water. One pint to a tree is sufficient.

WHEAT MARKET BREAKS

Portland, Ore., June 13.—The break in wheat prices had the effect yesterday of again stopping trading. Bids on all grades and deliveries were reduced 4 cents at the Merchants' Exchange. If offers were made on the outside they were not available. Stocks of old wheat are small and at no time have been freely offered, which makes covering of sales difficult, regardless of the trend of the market.

The Chicago wire to the Gray-Rosenbaum Grain company follows:

"Heavy liquidation breaking market devoid of sufficient buying power to cause more than unimportant recoveries. Situation looks discouraging. Country selling wheat freely. Europe apparently indifferent even on decline. Sentiment bearish but it will take something drastically different to turn market."

Strawberries Break.

The strawberry supply was heavier yesterday than the local demand could absorb and a considerable part of the receipts had to be carried over in spite of sharply reduced prices. On the early farmers' market good berries sold at \$1.50 to 1.75. Prices on the street in the afternoon ranged from \$1.25 to 1.50. Some of the large growers announced today they would have only about two more pickings.

Cube Butter Market Unchanged.
The cube butter market was firm at last week's prices. Shipping orders and buying for local storage took care of the surplus.

The demand for eggs has decreased as receipts have fallen off. Local consumption, which was heavy before the berry season, is now light. There was no change in prices yesterday.

Poultry and dressed meat arrivals were moderate and prices were steady.

CHICAGO GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, June 13.—Wheat prices were higher at the close of the Chicago board of trade today. Exports demand was better. Reports from Europe on crop conditions were a bullish factor.

Weather condition in the southwest continued favorable for the harvest. Receipts were light. Oats sold lower. Provisions were higher.

July wheat opened off 1-4 at \$1.09 1-4 and closed up 1; September opened off 3-4 at \$1.10 and closed up 3-4; December opened up 1-2 at \$1.17 3-4 and closed up 1.

July corn opened off 1-4 at 60 3-4 and closed unchanged; September opened off 3-4 at 61 3-4 and closed unchanged; December opened up 1-8 at 64¢ and closed off 1-8.

July oats opened off 3-8 at 55 1-4 and closed off 3-4; September opened unchanged at 57 1-2 and closed off 7-8. Dec.
