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BUSINESS CONDUCT OF SCHOOLS URGED IN RAY ACCEPTANCE

Leon L. Ray yesterday filed his acceptance of the nomination for director of the Eugene school district. In the statement of his acceptance Mr. Ray emphasizes his desire to help give Eugene a business administration of its school affairs. He recognizes, he says, no other issue in the campaign. The election is to be held next Monday.

Mr. Ray's statement as filed with the clerk of the school board follows: "The Eugene school district is carrying an indebtedness of at least \$200,000.00, the budget last year provided for the expenditure of \$182,535.00, of which amount but \$5,000.00 was to be applied in reducing the existing indebtedness; seven school buildings are being maintained, and the number of persons employed by the district is more than one hundred. The management of this school district, under these conditions, is essentially a business proposition, and especially so when we consider that Eugene is growing, and that the time is not far distant when additional buildings will have to be erected.

Board of Business Managers. "Our school system is maintained for the purpose of developing children into useful American citizens, and there is no reason why it should not be conducted in accordance with the same principles of business efficiency as are applied in the conduct of the affairs of private corporations. The board of directors in a school system the size of ours should be a board of business managers, carrying out the desires of the community on questions of general policy and devoting their attention to the business affairs of the district, and to the employment of a well trained and competent superintendent, and principals, who, in their turn, should be charged with the responsibility for the successful conduct of the class room work and with the designation of the teachers who should be employed. Such a policy is advocated by every modern school authority, and I believe that it should become the policy of the Eugene school board.

Has Been Teacher.

"I am interested in the successful conduct and efficiency of our schools from the view point of the teacher, having taken the teachers' training course at the University of Oregon, and served as the principal of both the Junction City and Cottage Grove high schools; as a taxpayer and citizen interested in Eugene's future development; and as a parent who expects his children to attend the Eugene public schools. Therefore, in response to the petition which has been filed I accept the nomination as a candidate for school director. In doing so, however, I want to say to those who have signed this petition and to the citizens of Eugene that I have not sought this nomination and that I am accepting it only as a public duty. My election, therefore, depends entirely upon those who desire to have a director elected who will endeavor to carry out the policies above outlined.

No Church Issues.

"Since consenting to permit the circulation of this petition, I have been repeatedly informed that rumors are being circulated to the effect that my candidacy is in the interests of the Catholic church. I do not know from whom these rumors emanate, but I want to say they are absolutely untrue. So far as I am concerned there is no religious issue in this election. Neither my private nor public acts have ever been dominated or controlled by the officials of any

church, or by any secret society, and I would never, under any circumstances, permit such influences to control my actions as school director. Anyone having any doubt as to the religious affiliations of myself, my parents, or my wife, may satisfy himself by calling the pastors of the Christian and Methodist churches of this city."

ELEVEN TO ATTEND SEABECK 'Y' MEET

Eleven representatives of the University of Oregon will visit the annual student Y. M. C. A. conference at Seabeck, Washington, which is held this year from June 10 to June 25. The party will be under the leadership of L. P. Putnam, secretary of the University Y. M. C. A., and will leave Eugene next Thursday. One or two autos will make the trip and the rest will go by train.

The following have signed up and will attend the conference: Webster Rible, president of the campus association, Dell Tetlow, Vernon Duncan, Paul Patterson, Henry Karpenstein, Arthur Everett, Bruce J. Giffon, Randolph Kuhn, Raymond Andrews, Glen Morrow, L. P. Putnam. Several others have indicated that they would attend.

More than 300 men from the various colleges and universities of the northwest attended the conference last year. Speakers are drawn from college presidents and professors, big business men and prominent ministers. President Campbell of the University of Oregon has heretofore been on the program but it was impossible for him to attend the meetings this year.

In addition to the meetings which are held as a part of the conference a number of athletic events have been scheduled. One of the big features of the ten days' outing is a track meet between the colleges which are represented. Other sports which are participated in are baseball, volleyball, tennis and swimming.

DIRECTORS DISCUSS ROAD AND RAILWAYS

The routing of the Pacific highway through Eugene, the proposed railroad merger and the building of the coast highway through the federal light house grounds at Hecla Head were the chief items of discussion before the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce at the regular meeting last night. Plans for the next meeting of the Chamber of Commerce in the municipal camp grounds on June 26 were reported to the directors by Secretary Eugene Chadwick.

The board unanimously agreed to support the tentative plan of the interstate commerce commission to consolidate the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific under the transportation act of 1920. The decision of the Chamber directors was made after considerable discussion as to what the divorcing of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific lines would mean to Oregon and also the effect it would have on the building of the Natron cutoff.

The directors heard complaints as to the routing of the Pacific highway through Eugene and it was agreed to call the matter to the attention of the city council and also to discuss it at the next regular meeting of the Chamber membership.

In regard to building the coast road through the Hecla light house grounds the secretary of the Chamber was directed to write to Representative Hawley, at Washington, D. C., and urge that permission be granted.

Church Workers to Consider Lane County Social Survey

A social and religious survey of Lane county, made three years ago by Rev. Joseph D. Boyd, will be presented to and considered by church workers and others interested at the Y. M. C. A. June 30. The report will be presented by Rev. John D. Rice, pastor of an Episcopal church in Portland, who checked up and revised the survey last year. Dr. William Anthony, of New York City, will assist in presenting and analyzing the report.

Dr. Anthony is one of the leaders of the Interchurch World movement, which was discontinued a few years ago. A vast amount of valuable material was collected by the workers engaged in this movement, including what was obtained by the Lane survey. Other surveys were made in seven other Oregon counties. A similar conference was held in Corvallis recently and was attended by 200 people.

Rev. Boyd was a student in sociology at the University of Oregon and used his report as a graduation thesis. It is on file at the University library and those who have read it say that it contains a great deal of information of value to those who are interested in bettering social and religious conditions in Lane county. Many of the conditions which exist in some Lane communities will be a surprise and a revelation to the average citizen, predicts Frank Eberhart, secretary of the Y. M. C. A.

New Storage Warehouse to Be Built in Eugene

To meet the demand for storage space, a new warehouse 60 by 150 feet in dimensions will be constructed by H. A. Smith and J. H. McDonald, retail lumber dealers, on their property on High street near Sixth avenue. The warehouse will be built for general storage purposes and is on a spur of the Southern Pacific so that loading and unloading will be facilitated. The new structure will be of one story. Work of breaking the ground for the building will start at once.

WATCHING THE SCORE BOARD

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Open Seasons Made Uniform By State Game Commission

Portland, June 13.—Open seasons for deer and all upland game birds were made uniform throughout the state by the state game commissioners in unanimous action taken Monday.

This is the first time that Oregon has had the seasons so regulated that the open season for a particular game bird will be the same in all parts of the state. The seasons will be as follows: Grouse and native pheasants, August 20 to September 20. Sage hens, July 15 to July 31. Prairie chickens, October 15 to October 31, in counties where there is open season.

LENIN'S ILLNESS CONFIRMED

London, June 13.—James O'Grady, a member of parliament, who has just returned from Moscow, brought confirmation of the reports that Nikolai Lenin, Russian premier, is seriously ill. Recently Lenin has been unable to remain at the government headquarters in the Kremlin and has been living in the country instead, according to O'Grady. Lenin is said to be suffering from the effects of a bullet wound, in addition to gastritis. The bullet wound resulted from the attempt of a girl to assassinate him two years ago. Doctors are said to be unwilling to attempt to remove the bullet from Lenin's spine for fear that an operation would cause death.
