EXPLOSION CAUSES FIRE; MILL BURNS

Tacoma, June 13.—An explosion in the engine room of the Mineral Lake Lumber company mill at Mineral, Washington, early Monday evening caused a fire which virtually destroyed the big mill, burned two dry kilns and several thousand feet of lumber stored in the yard. (Official estimates placed the loss this morning at approximately \$300,000.) The flames spread so rapidly after the explosion that the few men that were in the mill were forced to fall back and abandon their efforts to fight the flames.

Mrs. Martha Hollenbeck Dies At Daughter's Home

Junction City, Ore., June 13.—Died, June 11, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Leora Jones near Junction City, Mrs. Martha Elizabeth Hollenbeck, aged 82 years, 6 months and 22 days. Martha Elizabeth Spurgeon was born in Ohio, Dec. 20, 1840 and was married in Linn county, Iowa, in 1857 to Levi Hollenbeck. Mr. Hollenbeck died about one year ago. To this union eight children were born six of whom survive as follows: Mrs. Leora Jones of near Junction; Mrs. Etta Ferguson of Lake Saskatchewan, Alberta, Canada, Alva A. of Mapleton, Lillie B. Wade of Centralia, Wash.; Charles M. of Red Deer, Alberta, Canada; and George W. of Liberty Bond, Wash. Nineteen grandchildren and 34 great grandchildren. The body is at the Miller chapel in Junction and will be shipped Wednesday morning to Mapleton where funeral services will be held upon the arrival of the Coos Bay train at Mapleton about 12 o'clock Wednesday, June 14. Mr. and Mrs. Hollenbeck have been residents of Lane county for many years. They have lived at Mapleton for about 25 years. Before going to Mapleton they lived for a number of years west of Junction, also at Irving.

Fifteen Hurt In Riot At Vera Cruz, Mexico

Nogales, Ariz., June 13.—Fifteen persons, including a woman, were injured in a street battle at Vera Cruz between striking street sweepers and police, according to advices received here today. Strikers attacked strikebreakers put at work by the city, and when police were called by Alderman Salome Cordoba, in charge of the work, the mob attacked them with stones and several shots were fired.

Police returned the fire and dispersed the mob suffering almost equal casualties. Several of those hurt received serious injuries.
