GLAND TRANSFER NO NEW THING IN EAST

Chicago, June 21.—Purchase of human glands on a large scale such as has never been realized by the general public for the rejuvenating of aging men, was revealed here today by medical authorities.

The operation on Harold F. McCormick, by which the life giving glands of a young man were reported to have been grafted on the 51 year old millionaire, has merely served to attract attention of the public to these operations, which have been no secret to the medical profession for several years, one surgeon stated.

Voronoff Not Optimistic.

By WEBB MILLER (United Press Staff Correspondent) Paris, June 21.—Gland transplanting operations, such as that which Harold F. McCormick is reported to have submitted to, have been performed several times in Germany, but have been only partially successful, Dr. Zeyer Voronoff, famous surgeon, said today in an interview.

"This indifferent success," he said, "was due to the fact that the patient from whom the gland was taken for transplanting was not entirely healthy. However, if a man can be found willing to part with the gland, it's an excellent method."

Dr. Voronoff announced that he is pursuing gland experiments at the present time and will be ready to make important revelations in the autumn.

Work is Very Secret.

Meanwhile his work is very secret. "I will explain the entire results of years of experiments," he said. "I will exhibit men who have been treated and been rejuvenated."

"This will be done before the French surgical congress in October at which surgeons from many nations, including the United States will be able to learn how glands are transplanted by correct methods."

Dr. Voronoff said he had always used

monkey glands in his experiments, but that glands from men were just as useful if men could be found to make the sacrifice.

"I will produce at least one Englishman on the platform who has been rejuvenated and who has sufficient moral courage to admit it publicly," he declared.

MAY RECLAIM 1500 ACRES AROUND LAKE

The reclaiming of 1500 acres bordering on Triangle Lake was pronounced very feasible by two experts from G. A. C. and the farmers of that section started yesterday to organize for the work, according to Ira P. Whitney, county agricultural agent. Professors George W. Kable, drainage specialist and W. L. Powers, soil specialist, of the Oregon Agricultural college, and Mr. Whitney spent the last two days at the lake.

The reclaiming of the land around the lake is to be accomplished by widening the lake outlet so that a constant shore line can be established even during the flood periods. The project will also carry with it the straightening of the Lake creek channel so that it would carry more water. It can be done without impairing the scenic beauties of the lake, says Mr. Whitney.

Professor Powers declared that the land adjacent was wonderfully productive and if properly drained would be one of the garden spots of Oregon. After the survey was made the farmers heard the experts' report at the grange hall and elected a committee to lay plans for the organization of a drainage district. Those chosen on the committee were M. Johnson, E. J. Norton, S. McKen and J. A. Duckette.

The Meadowview drainage district have reported the required acreage signed up and will file their petition to have the district organized next week, according to Mr. Whitney. Probably actual work on this project will start this fall.

Western Miners Against Denison "Blue Sky" Bill

Denver, Colo., June 21.—The western mining congress today was an earnestly against the Denison "blue sky" bill now before congress. Mining men of several western states in session here urged the substitution of a bill which would not be "blue sky" in character. The conference also urged abolition of all unnecessary tax consuming bureaus and entered a protest against government interference with private business and personal liberties.
