

There is a large number of candidates, nominated for the honors at last meeting, from which the four will be chosen. The woman's auxiliary will send two delegates.

**Coroner's Jury Report**—That no one was to blame for the death of W. H. Brasfield, who was killed in a collision between a flat car and an auto at Springfield early yesterday morning, was the verdict of the coroner's jury at the inquest which was held by W. W. Braslette at Springfield yesterday afternoon. H. R. Thompson, who was driving the auto, testified that when he reached the Fifth street private crossing he suddenly saw a string of flat cars backing towards him. He was already on the track and was unable to get away in time to prevent the accident.

**K. C. Hospital Worker Here**—W. T. O'Brien, of Tucson, Arizona, arrived last evening to look after a tract of land which he owns near Lowell. He expects to be here for a few days, having come from Seattle and Portland on a summer vacation trip. Mr. O'Brien has charge of the social welfare work in the government tuberculosis hospital at Tucson, where 300 ex-service men are being taken care of.
