

SUNDAY SCHOOLS TO MEET AT HATCHERY

Special songs will be sung by the Miller family of Vida, Frank Page of Walterville, and A. W. Freeze of Leeburg. Attorney Slattery will speak again this year.

Group officers are glad to announce that Dr. T. J. McCrossan of Albany, will give two great addresses during the day. He has chosen the following topics:

1—"Reasons Why We Know the Bible is Inspired."

2—"Why the Salvation of Christ is a Great Salvation."—Heb. 2:3.

Dr. McCrossan was pastor of the Oliver street Presbyterian church in Minneapolis, Minn., for 12 years before coming to Albany. He was once a teacher of Greek in Ontario university.

Dr. McCrossan especially urges a large attendance of young people, as the number of young people who are losing all faith in the Bible is appalling, he says.

Missionary Griffis of the American Sunday School union, says this should be a great religious gathering, people coming from many parts of the valley. This is not a meeting for only Sunday school of church members, he said, but everyone is invited regardless of race or creed. Cople, superintendent. Indications were that the Western Pacific would do everything possible to identify the rioters.

Say Men Came From Sacramento

San Francisco, July 13.—The rioters who attacked the Western Pacific shops in Oroville early today went there from Sacramento by automobile, company officials here announced today. They said their information clearly indicated that the mob was not made up of their striking Oroville employees.

Answering the attack the Western Pacific announced that it intended to protect every bit of its property and every inch of its line from any further depredations.

Denison Riots Continue.

Denison, Texas, July 13.—Rioting was raged here today when two additional strikebreakers were kidnapped by a mob and beaten.

Twelve strikebreakers, kidnapped by a mob here yesterday, were still missing today. Five other victims of the mob were being treated in hospitals.

Pickets continued today at all entrances to shops here. In spite of a downpour of rain, wives of many pickets also were on duty.

Apprehension was felt here over reports that state troops may be sent to Denison. No word has been received from Governor Neff, who is on a campaign speaking tour. Additional United States marshals are scheduled to arrive today and it is feared more strikebreakers will be brought in.

Saginaw Scene of Trouble.

Saginaw, Mich., July 13.—Four thousand striking shopmen and sympathizers here stormed the Pere Marquette round house and strikebreakers were severely beaten and others driven away.

Frank T. Newton, United States marshal from Detroit assumed charge of the situation quieting the mob.

Wires For Troops.

Detroit, Mich., July 13.—United States Marshal Frank T. Newton, on its return from the strike trouble-center at Saginaw, Mich., today wired Attorney General Daugherty at Washington for authority to call out the United States troops at Fort Wayne.

Newton stated in his wire that it was his belief that sufficient special deputies were not available at Saginaw in event of any further trouble.

The marshal's office stated here today that word had been received from the trouble center that all was quiet today.

GOVERNMENT TO PROTECT TRAINS CARRYING MAIL

Weeks then sent the following telegram to General Hines:

"Receiver of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas line, operating in Texas, reports that his operations are being impeded by lawlessness and violence. He will appeal to the governor of Texas for protection. If the protection is not afforded by state authorities the federal government will take steps and you will prepare sufficient force for that purpose."

Not to Wait on State.

"We are not going to wait long for states to act," said Weeks later. "We are not going to stand for violence which will result in the killing of many people."

There are two reasons why we will intervene in Texas if the state does not

act. The first is that the receiver, Schaff, is a government agent, acting under orders of the federal court. The second is that interference with transportation of mails and the movement of the interstate commerce will not be allowed."

In the appeal for troops, Receiver Schaff stated that at Denison, the round house foreman was shot and killed; a guard was taken from a passenger train by a mob of strikers and sent out of

town, that a number of other guards have been beaten up and private cars of livestock and beef detained because of interference by the strikers.

Planes Ready for Service.

Hundreds of the naval seaplanes and land planes along the coast from Newport, R. I., around to San Diego, Cal., will be placed at the disposal of the post-office department for carrying mail should the railroad situation reach an

acute stage. It was stated at the navy department today. The entire organization could be ready for service at almost an hour's notice.

HARVEST WAGES ESTABLISHED

La Grande, Ore., July 13.—The wages of farm hands during the harvest this year are practically the same as a year ago. The scale decided upon by the Union county farm bureau is \$2 to \$2.50 a day

for hand labor, header box driver, wheat drivers and hay hands. The driver on combines receives \$3 a day, header purchasers receive \$3 a day, provided at these wages.
