## UNLIMITED LOANS FOR LANE FARMERS

Any volume of loans which the local farm loan association may desire will be taken care of by the Federal Farm Loan banks, according to a letter received by W. A. Ayres, secretary of the local association. The federal farm loan bureau will send another appraiser to Lane county soon to look over property of applicants for loans. There has been federal loans of nearly one million dollars floated already in Lane county. Money has been actually received on \$300,000 in loans and \$100,000 is pending. The loans are secured for five and one-half per cent interest and one per cent principal and at this rate mature in 31 years.  
"There has been some trouble in getting the government to loan money on Lane county farm property when the funds were available and now that there is plenty of government money to be had farmers have a real opportunity to take advantage of these long time loans," says Mr. Ayres. "Any farmer with adequate security can get a loan on his farm."  
"The local association is in very good standing with the federal land banks because its borrowers have met their payments promptly and their property has been good security. With the long time loans available and the Eugene banks ready to take care of short loans to move crops the farmer is better off this season than for several years."

## WOMAN CANDIDATE QUELLS OLD FEUD

St. Paul, Minn., July 13.—Minnesota democrats' Joan of Arc sped homeward in a flyer yesterday after preventing a serious split in the party's ranks.  
Anna Dickie Olson, democratic nominee for United States senator, was credited with squelching an outbreak of an old-time party feud among the democratic state central committee here.  
Zeke Austin and Frank Day, committee members have been fighting for 20 years. They renewed the scrap at the committee meeting today.  
When the fireworks began, Mrs. Olson appealed for harmony. She got it. Zeke Austin jumped to his feet, yelling: "Here is a modern Joan of Arc, let's all follow her lead."  
Frank Day joined in the cry with "bravo."  
The fight was over and every word of the quarrel was expunged from the record.  
"Mrs. Olson is more like Caesar than Joan of Arc," said Howard Everett, committee chairman.  
"Like Caesar she might say 'I came, I saw, I conquered,' but she is too damned modest to even think she did it."  
Mrs. Olson left before the meeting closed. Thursday is house cleaning day in Clonnet and the flyering isn't any too good on Minnesota roads.

## Florence Makes Plans to Entertain Eugene

Elaborate plans for the western Lane fair to be held in Florence September 14, 15, 16, are being made. More than 500 people from Eugene and other towns of the Willamette valley are expected to be present on Eugene day, September 15, and reduced fares have been secured on the Southern Pacific railroad, according to D. M. Kyle, in charge of transportation for the fair.  
A big seafood dinner and salmon barbecue on the beach are among the features of the fair on Eugene day. The visitors will be met at Cushman with barges and ferried down the Siuslaw to Florence. Henry L. Bergmann is president and general manager of the fair this year.  
The dates directly precede the Lane county fair and plans are to bring the best of the exhibit here for the occasion as well as send a large western Lane delegation to Eugene.

## Race and Religious Issues In Jackson

Medford, July 13.—County Clerk Flory today called a special election for August 1 when Jackson county will vote on the recall of Sheriff Terrill. This decision was reached after checking the names of 1700 persons who signed the recall petitions. While many of the names were temporarily stricken there, from the county clerk called the election after receiving an opinion from the state attorney general and the district attorney that the signatures were legal.  
"The election promises to be the bitterest and hardest fought in the history of southern Oregon," Rev. Oldfield and Rev. Koshler of Ashland, in a signed statement, yesterday admitted promoting the recall with the backing of the Medford and Ashland Ministerial associations and the Women's Christian Temperance Union organizations of the two cities.  
Sheriff Terrill has been a stern center of Jackson county politics for years. He is backed by the citizens' committee, composed of leading citizens without regard to religious or political faith. This organization was founded when Governor Olcott ordered prosecution last week of outrages committed in Jackson county last spring and now claims a membership of close to 1000.  
The recall petitions contain no specific allegations against Sheriff Terrill except "inefficiency in office and non-performance of duty." The recall backers claim to have affidavits supporting specific instances.  
D. M. Lowe, farmer and fair exhibit collector will make the race against Sheriff Terrill.  
Threatened mandamus proceedings by John J. Jefferys, Ki Kluk attorney of Portland, went before the boards when the county clerk called the election.

## KAPPAS HKE IN ROCKIES

Glacier Park, Mont., July 13.—Three hundred college girls, compelling the attendance and active delegate membership of Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority are here today for their 1922 convention at Glacier National park.  
The convention, which was declared to be the first regular convention ever held in the park, will last all week. The first business sessions were held Tuesday and last night the entire group biked five miles from Many Glacier hotel to Lake Josephine, in the heart of the Rocky mountains, for a picnic on the lake shore, returning to their hotel by moonlight.  
When the convention ends Saturday many of the delegates intend to continue westward on a tour of America's national park system.

## Babe Sees Dad Slay Mother, Grandfather

Cleveland, O., July 13.—Three-year-old Annie Mittenmuller, was sole witness of the killing of her mother and grandfather and the attempted suicide of her father here. John Mittenmuller, the father, went to the grandfather's house to pay alimony due his former wife, Mrs. Katie Mittenmuller. He talked to the woman while the child played around their feet, gleefully to see father and mother together.  
Then, police say, Mittenmuller drew a revolver and killed the woman and Frank Bloom, the grandfather.  
As neighbors rushed in Mittenmuller shot himself. He is in a dying condition.  
WEST FOR UNION PACIFIC  
Bend, July 13.—Oswald West, former governor of Oregon, addressing the Bend Commercial club, Wednesday, urged its members to get behind the Union Pacific program of railroad development as the best for the future of the state as a whole. He declared that the Union Pacific must gain access to the Willamette valley, if railroad construction is to be made across the state. West went on record as favoring a direct line from Bend to Crane.

## Burns Deluded In His Marriage Says Nurse

Los Angeles, July 13.—Matthew P. Burns was under the illusion that he had married Gloria Swanson, film queen, and not her mother, according to evidence presented in court. E. H. McBride, special nurse employed to take care of Burns by the star's mother, testified in the suit of Burns' relatives to break the will by which he left his whole estate to Gloria and her mother, said that Burns used to assure him that he was Miss Swanson's husband.  
He said Burns was irrational while he was under care at the Eagle Rock sanitarium near here. Mrs. Margaret A. Graham, Burns' sister and one of the plaintiffs, declared that Burns exhibited signs of insanity shortly after the death of his first wife, Mrs. Lena Burns, in 1914. Mrs. A. O. Phelan, another witness, said Burns, who used to call on her, became a nuisance to her through his constant habit of playing with a ouija board.
