Under strike conditions best explained by
Chairman Ben W. Hooper of the United
States Railroad Labor Board in his
statement of July 1 reading as follows:

In this case the conflict is not between
the employer and the oppressed em-
ployee. The people of this country,
through an act of congress, signed by
President Wilson, established a tribu-
nal to decide such disputes over wages
and working conditions, which are sub-
mitted to it in a proper manner. It is
the decision of this tribunal against
which the shop crafts are striking.

"Regardless of any question of the right
of the men to strike, the men who take
the strikers' places are merely ac-
cepting the wages and working condi-
tions prescribed by a government tri-
bunal and are performing a public ser-
vice. They are not accepting the wages
and working conditions which an em-
ployer is trying to impose. For this
reason, public sentiment and full gov-
ernment power will protect the men
who remain in their positions and new
men who may come in."

Adequate provisions have been made
for the full protection of all employees,
the same as old employees who have re-
mained loyal at work. Applicants

CHICAGO GRAIN REVIEW
Chicago, July 21.—Heavy selling by
longs caused wheat prices to decline
sharply at the close of the Chicago board
of trade today. Decline in the foreign
markets with decreasing demand from
exporters was the principal factor in the
drop. Heavy receipts of all grains added
to the selling pressure. Corn and oats
declined fractionally in sympathy with
wheat.

Provisions were irregular. Reports that
Argentine crops were suffering from too
much moisture and would be below ex-
pectations caused some bullish sentiment.
July wheat opened up 1-2 at \$1.13 1/2
and closed off 1-8. September opened
1-2 at \$1.12 1-2 and closed off 1-8.
December opened up 1-4 at \$1.14 1/8 and
closed off 2-4.

July corn opened up 1-2 at 63 1-2 and
closed off 5-8. September opened up 1-8
at 64 3-4 and closed off 1-2. December
opened up 1-8 at 61 3-4 and closed
off 1-2.

Jul oats opened unchanged at 33 7-8c
and closed off 1-3-8.
September opened up 1-8 at 36c and
closed off 1-4. December opened un-
changed at 36c and closed off 1-4-1.

Woman Is Victim
of Land Fakirs
Santa Ana, Cal., July 21.—Losing \$12-
000 cash, finding oranges tied in
mossy bushes instead of orange gro-
ves, and meeting one's sister for the first
time in years, is the story of Mrs. Geo.
Ludlow of Medicine Hat, Canada.
Several months ago while living at

Valencia, Canada, Mrs. Ludlow purch-
ased what was represented to be a 15
acre orange grove in Texas, near Mexu-
an on the Mexican border.
About a month ago Mrs. Ludlow start-
ed out to look up her \$12,000 worth of
land and oranges, but when they got
there they found reasonably fertile land,
but no orange trees. Nothing but mes-
quite bushes, to whose scraggy branches
were tied mossy little dried-up oranges.
Mrs. Ludlow stated that while the land
is good, it is too far from a railroad at
present to make it of any value for farm-
ing. She declared that many of her
friends were fleeced by the scheme.
She immediately came to Santa Ana,
where she is visiting her sister, Mrs.
George McPhie. The case has been re-
ported to the postoffice authorities, who
are conducting an investigation with view
to prosecution for swindling by using the
name Mrs. Ludlow had not seen her sis-
ter here for 18 years, but her misfortune
served to bring them together.
