Meals Are Expected

When all the cows of the Thompson herd complete their official test records in a few months indications are that they will bring to Lane county four gold and seven silver medals and a new record for a herd of 10 cows in America.

While every animal of the Thompson herd shows quality and high milk and butterfat production there are two outstanding cows. Silver Chimes Giretta, 1 year and 10 months old is making a world record for her class as a senior yearling. She outpoints the former record holder by a count of 28, a cow which sold for \$8000 at the last international stock show.

Engineer's Georgia, the second leading animal, is the third cow in Lane county to win a gold medal. George Platt, of Thurston, produced the first cow and Harvey Blank of Junction City, the second, only a few weeks ago. Both these breeders were present at the Jubilee.

Silver Chimes Herd Sire

The herd sire of the Thompson 10-cow herd which promises to break the world's record is Silver Chimes of Ashnook, 133010, whose sire is Silver Chimes G. S. P. 95221, and whose dam is Lola Queen, 229068. By the record of the herd Silver Chimes of Ashnook has qualified for a gold and a silver medal under the rules of the American Jersey Cattle club.

The 10 cows of the prospective world's record herd are as follows:

Engineer's Georgia, 408506, age 4 years 1 month, sire Brave Engineer, 108-802, dam, Georgia Grace, 180198. The cow gave birth to a heifer calf July 19.

Tests 6.48, butterfat 10.81, milk 10,810 pounds.

Silver Chimes Queen, 410808, age 4 years, sire Silver Chimes of Ashnook, dam Deercoube Lassie. Tests 7.11, butterfat 11.83, milk 10,851 pounds.

Silver Chimes Gertie, 390779, 4 years old, sire Silver Chimes of Ashnook, dam Deercoube Lassie. Will freshen for class AA, making a gold and silver medal. Tests 6.48, butterfat 10.81, milk 12,384 pounds.

Silver Chimes Daisy Pet, 446240, age 2 years, 11 months, sire Silver Chimes of Ashnook, dam Dora's Daisy Dimple, 350978. Will freshen for class AA, making a silver medal. Tests 6.13, butterfat 10.81, milk 11,371 pounds.

Silver Chimes Dora June, 446241, age 2 years, 11 months, sire Silver Chimes of Ashnook, dam Dora's Flora Lass, 288-976, will freshen for class AA, making a silver medal. Tests 6.22, butterfat 10.81, milk 12,384 pounds.

Dora's Daisy Dimple, 390478, 5 years, 1 month, sire Silver Chimes of Ashnook, dam Dora's Flora Lass. Will freshen for class AA making a gold medal. Tests 5.17, butterfat 10.81, milk 11,371 pounds.

Dora's Flora Lass, 288976, age 8 years, 2 months, sire Flora's Butter Boy, 97790, dam Dora of Ashland 109750, will freshen for class AA. Tests 5.92, butterfat 10.81, milk 11,371 pounds.
