Story of How Late Dr. Bell Became an Inventor Published

Washington, D. C., Aug. 19.—The fascinating story of how he came to be an inventor was charmingly published in the course of his last published article in the "Prehistoric Telephone Days," contained in the National Geographic Magazine for March, 1922. Special interest attaches to this article, not only because of its historic value as relating the steps leading up to the invention of the telephone, but because it is one of the few occasions when Dr. Bell, in his many writings, engaged in personal reminiscences. "I will have to go back to my grandfather, Alexander Bell of London, England," Dr. Bell wrote.
