

BODY OF WILLIAM FESSELL, TRAPPED MINER, IS MISSING

Jackson, Cal., Sept. 21.—Forty-six mine victims of the Argonaut tragedy have been identified.

But the body of the forty-seventh miner trapped in the burning mine cannot be found.

The missing body is that of William Fessell.

Miners at Jackson are saying today that Fessell died, separated from the crew, seeking a passage through which fresh air could be given to the imprisoned miners.

Once hailed the hero of the catastrophe because he was believed to be the writer of the note found on the bulkhead that the dying men had built, Fessell's name is now blazoned with glory in Jackson.

May Have Sought Shaft.

Alone, it is believed he went seeking the lower gates of the Muldoon shaft. He hoped to open them to ventilate the mine.

But in his absence the gas became so strong that his men were forced to build the bulkhead, blocking Fessell from rejoining them, it is thought.

Another theory, to the effect that Fessell may have attempted a lone climb to the 4200-foot level, is being investigated.

When the bulkhead at the 4250-foot level, behind which the 46 bodies were found, was broken down, a raise is reported to have been discovered near the back of the drift. The raise went up 90 feet, almost to the 4200-foot level, and then extended for 150 feet. Careful search is now being made for Fessell's body, which may have been covered up by a cave-in.

Coroner's Jury Meets.

Jackson, Cal., Sept. 21.—The Argonaut mine will give up its last victim early today. Men worked all through the night canvassing and raising the bodies of the men who gave their lives for gold.

The coroner's jury will meet again today for a short session.

There is a bit of irony in the meetings of the jury today and yesterday.

The jurors convened for the purpose of legally ascertaining that the men are dead.

What man, woman or child in Jackson does not know that forty-seven men have been taken by death.

The funeral will be held tomorrow. Every automobile will be pressed into service to bring the bodies of the dead from the Argonaut mill to the graveyards. Plans for a public procession have been abandoned.

The coffins will be brought down quietly before most of Jackson is awake and silently laid beside the graves.

Ceremonies will be magnificent. On the morning of the funeral the coroner's jury will start its hearing.

Shift Boss Blamed by Some.

Feelings among the bereaved have been directed against Clarence Bradshaw, shift boss, who did not send the skip back into the mine after he got out on the day of the fire. He will be cleared, it was predicted by Fred L. Lowell, safety engineer of the industrial accident commission of California. He said:

"Bradshaw was brought to the surface partially under the influence of gas. Furthermore, it is improbable that the skip could have brought up the men. The heat must have been intense and would have ignited the rope with which the cable is wound and weakened the cable. In that case it would have broken with a load of miners, killing them all instantly."

Lowell has been summoned by the jurors and he probably will tell them the same thing.

Miners may give different views if they are called.

Lowell is in a peculiar position as a witness, his bureau having passed upon a safety of the mine before the accident.

WHEAT BIDS ARE HIGHER

Portland, Sept. 21.—The stronger eastern markets were responsible for advances of 1 to 2 cents in local wheat bids at the Merchants Exchange, except in the case of September western white, offers for which were 1 cent lower than Tuesday. Premiums recently quoted on export wheat have failed to bring additional supplies on the market.

New crop prices on bakers' flour are generally quoted at \$6.50 and bluestem patents at \$7.25.

Butter Trade in Firm Position.

The butter market was very firm in tone, in view of the strength at San Francisco, but the trade in Portland and Seattle, showed no inclination to follow the advance at this time.

Eggs were 3 cents higher all along the line. The association advanced its selling prices to this extent and other dealers revised their quotations to the same basis.

Poultry was in good demand, particularly heavy hens, and prices were firm. Country dressed meats were unchanged.
