"IN THE NAME OF THE LAW"

YALE GIVEN SHADE OF ADVANTAGE OVER IOWA IN EAST-WEST GAME

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 13.—Out of the west, not unlike young Luchino, of old, some eleven or more husky Hawkeye warriors to test the mettle of Old Eli in the year's big intercollegiate football battle.

East and West are stirred over the contest as never before at midseason. Fair weather is promised for the battle, crackling football air such as a late Indian summer had not yet provided, and 50,000 spectators are expected for the contest.

Old-Time Fans Gather.
The Yale-Iowa game tomorrow has called society, old-time football heroes and pigskin fans from all parts of the east, to New Haven. Some have come from the Mississippi valley, the scene of Iowa's conclusive victory over western conference opponents last year.

It will be inspiration against tradition when the big teams meet. The Hawkeye eleven will be carrying the west's challenge to eastern claims of football supremacy. Old Eli will be dug in to defend the claim.

Picking a winner is easy. Only a tie can baffle the prophets. Coach Jones' men should triumph. Brother Howard directs the Iowa team, and brother Tad the Yale eleven, so it will be all in the family however it comes out.

Locke Is Bad Man.
The blue line up is otherwise upset by early season injuries, but Tad Jones will have two bright young men hitherto untied in a big game, upon whom he can rely.

Captain Gordon Locke of Iowa will be the hardest man to stop that Yale has tackled since George Owen played on the building line last fall. The kickoff will be at 2:30.

Second Games Tomorrow

New York, Oct. 13.—The gridiron horse of the big game has been served and more or less reliably in eastern football circles. The big schools are now awaiting the second course which, it is hoped, will consist of some palatable species of fish without any bones. Bones at this time of the year are to be strictly avoided because a broken tooth or so in a football game is not a pleasant thing to have.

All but Yale, Poor Yale—somebody played a rather unsportsmanlike trick on the wearers of blue by sneaking a couple of handfuls of pepper into their consummation and the first two swallows were somewhat of a surprise. Not only that, but they are now faced with a manipulated steak in the shape of the Iowa eleven.

Others Just Beginning.
It's hardly fair when the other members of the big three are only beginning to dine.

Harvard will mix things with Bowdoin tomorrow, which will probably be no more than a short workout for the Crimson team.

Princeton is a bit apprehensive over tomorrow's engagement with Colgate. The Colgate eleven under the coaching of Dick Harlow, former Penn State star, may have absorbed a brand of football which may prove very annoying to the Tigers in their present stage of development.

SHY IS PESSIMISTIC OVER CLUB CONTEST

Oregon's 37 to 0 victory over the Willamette university eleven here last Saturday was not only a record for the school but also a record for the club. This week finds so many first string players on the sidelines with injuries that Huntington is not at all optimistic as to Oregon's chances in the game with Multnomah athletic club here tomorrow.

Gram and Chapman, backfield men, are both out of the game for another week at least. Gram had his chest badly injured and will not be able to play for two weeks more. Quarterback Chapman was hurt and while it would be possible for him to play Saturday, Huntington would rather lose to the Portland club than run the risk of having his star quarter receive further injuries. "Chuck" Parsons, who this year is developing into one of the most dependable linebacks, had his back wrenched and if he plays at all tomorrow it will be but for a short period. McGraw, a promising candidate for guard was carried from the field with an injured knee and is probably out for the season. Other members of the "repaired squad" are "Tiny" Shields and "Punk" Callison, two year lettermen, incapacitated last summer, who have neither one recovered sufficiently to engage in active practice yet.

Multnomah Comes Tomorrow.
Multnomah will invade Eugene tomorrow with one of the strongest eleven the club has ever put out, according to a survey of the team. The club eleven includes with former stars of coast colleges and under the coaching of Ted Faulk, former University of Washington star, has been developed into a heavy, hard fighting team.

Coach Huntington will have to resort to the ranks of his first string subs in patching up his line for the coming contest. It is probable that Ward Johnson, regular varsity half back, will start the game at quarter with King and Jordan as halves and Isthmian at fullback. This will leave Russell Brown, Jans Terjeson and Edwin Kirby of Pendleton, and Jack Myers from which to draw if occasion demands.

Shields, Callison Will Help.
Following the Multnomah game, Huntington expects to get his regular first string picked and organized. Unless more men are injured in the contest with the clubmen, practically all of the regular first string men will be in condition to start intensive training by then and the progress of the team ought to be rapid. The return of Callison and Shields will bolster up the line wonderfully. It is probable they will be in shape to take part in the game with Whitman at Pendleton, October 20 and if not by then, at least by October 28 when Idaho and Oregon will tangle in Portland.

None of the varsity squad members are in good condition. This was made evident in the game with Willamette on Saturday when time was called repeatedly because of injuries major and minor. Coaches realize this and are putting the gridsters through strenuous practice this week but the real work of team formation and effective signal and team work must await the return of veterans now nursing injuries on the sidelines.

Vegetables Come Fast to Cannery
Beets, carrots, cabbage and pumpkins are being received in large quantities at the Eugene Fruit Growers' association cannery this week. All the drying of prunes has been completed and the force is working on vegetables again. A large crop in the vegetable line is expected.

The refrigerator car shortage has been relieved and shipments are going out regularly.

The fruit growers' plant started drying walnuts for the first time this week and a very good grade is being turned out. While the walnut drying will not be done on a very large scale this year, it is expected that the nuts will be one of the heavy departments in a few years.

Weather Prevents Non-Stop Air Trip
San Diego, Cal., Oct. 12.—Unfavorable weather conditions in the east and middle west again delayed the start of the non-stop coast-to-coast flight at day-break this morning. Lieutenants Oakley Kelly and John MacReady, who will pilot the giant specially built army monoplane during the trip, announced they will make all possible efforts to hop off from Rockwell field here on Sunday morning.

FROSH WILL PLAY MT. ANGEL
Mount Angel College, St. Benedict, Oct. 13.—The Mount Angel college grid squad will meet the Oregon freshmen at the local grounds Saturday. Coach Kasberger is not very certain as to the outcome of the game for it is going to be a hard battle for the Mount Angel team, as this will be their first real clash. According to Coach Kasberger, the team is very little better than last year's squad, which suffered such a terrible defeat at the hands of the Oregon freshmen.

Seattle, Oct. 13.—One hundred and eighteen mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending October 7th, manufactured 88,000,000 feet of lumber; sold 99,639,773 feet; and shipped 67,333,501 feet.

900,000 feet of lumber; sold 99,639,773 feet; and shipped 67,333,501 feet.

Production for reporting mills was 10 percent, above normal. New business 25 percent below production. Shipments were 1 percent above new business. Fifty percent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 33,486,775 feet, of which 27,320,674 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 6,166,101 feet for over-seas shipment. New business for delivery by rail amounted to 1,165 cars.

Forty percent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 26,749,501 feet of which 19,754,753 feet moved coastwise and inter-coastal; and 6,994,748 feet export. Rail shipments amounted to 1,353 cars. Unfilled domestic cargo orders total 115,871,837 feet. Unfilled export orders 21,653,940 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders 6,881 cars.

In forty weeks production has been 3,279,475,016 feet; new business 3,189,322,196 feet; shipments 3,152,991,655 feet.
