The new California-Oregon power line was built in what engineers declare is record time. Two steel towers are to be erected on either side of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company mill pond at Springfield and it is said that the work on both ends to connect the system will be done inside of two weeks.

Mountain States Power company engineers have constructed the temporary gas main across the Willamette river and disconnected the main which ran across the old street car bridge. Pair Indicted For Forgery Arraigned

Charles R. Cord and Archie Fair, indicted by the grand jury on charges of forgery, were arraigned in circuit court and the time set for pleading on Monday morning. Cord was accused of altering a check passed in Cottage Grove and Fair was arrested and indicted on a charge of forging a check at the McMoran and Washburne store.

The jury term of circuit court opens Monday morning and several cases brought through indictments to the August special grand jury will be tried along with civil cases.

Grand Jury Ends With Cronkhite Murder Case

Tacoma, Oct. 13.—Following the return of two secret indictments this morning, the federal grand jury which has been in session for more than a month was discharged by Judge E. E. Cushman. The jury has been conducting a probe of the death of Major Alexander Cronkhite at Camp Lewis in October, 1918, in connection with whose death from a pistol wound, Captain Robert Rosenbluth of New York has been mentioned. Whether or not the indictments returned were in connections with the Cronkhite probe, court authorities refused to state.

Seeks Foreclosure to Secure \$13,000 Note

Seeking to recover \$13,000 alleged due on a promissory note dated at Portland September 23, 1921, Eugene R. McCormack filed suit in circuit court today against Leonard and Andrew Grady and others. The plaintiff desires to foreclose on a tract of 270 acres of land on the North Fork of the Shumway river mortgage to secure the note.

A decree foreclosing on a tract of 213.25 acres of land to secure payment on a promissory note for \$1000 was handed down by the court today in the case of the State Bank of Coquille against Robert S. Wynd and others. The note was dated September 18, 1920.

CHICAGO GRAIN REVIEW

Chicago, Oct. 13.—Grain prices advanced sharply on the Chicago board of trade today on heavy buying for export. Corn and oats were the leaders in the upturn, due to a feeling among local traders that coarse grain prices were out of line and too cheap in comparison with wheat.

Cash corn prices advanced sharply in the last hour of trading. Provisions closed lower.

December wheat opened up 3-4 at \$1.09 1-2 and closed up 1-4. May opened up 3-4 at \$1.11 and closed up 1-4. July opened up 1-4 at \$1.03 1-2 and closed unchanged.

December corn opened up 1-4 at 64 and closed up 1-8. May opened up 3-4 at 65 1-2 and closed up 3-8. July opened up 1-4 at 63 5-8 and closed up 1-8.

December oats opened up 1-8 at 29 3-4 and closed up 1-4. May opened up 1-2 at 40 1-2 and closed up 3-8. July opened up 5-8 at 29 and closed up 1-4.
