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\$1,441,486 A YEAR'S DISASTER RELIEF COST

Red Cross Aided 145,000 Victims in United States—Losses Total \$30,000,000.

Seventy-two disasters, with hundreds reported killed and injured, and more than 145,000 either homeless or requiring assistance, called for emergency relief measures and the expenditure of \$1,441,486.36 by the American Red Cross during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, according to a statement based on the forthcoming annual report of the Red Cross. The greatest toll of life was taken by hurricane and tornado, while the overflowing of rivers, the breaking of dams and torrential rains drove the greatest number of people from their homes.

RUSSIAN LOGGERS EMIGRATE

Bellingham, Wash., Oct. 21. (United Press)—Emigration of Russian loggers to work on concessions in their native country is causing a shortage of skilled labor in logging camps of the state of Washington, according to J. C. Nichols, proprietor of a logging employment agency here. "Several shiploads of these men have returned to Siberia and Russia from Seattle and New York to work in big timber concessions just being opened up by the Soviet through foreign capital," according to Nichols. "Logging camps are calling for help to replace these men, and the task is a heavy one, as skilled loggers are few and the logging business is starting to boom."

Walla Walla Claims World's Oldest Mule

Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 21. (United Press)—Much has been written and perhaps sung about the nation's oldest man, but nothing has been said about the animal said to be the country's oldest mule. Jessie, an 88-year-old mule, flicks an indignant paintbrush tail and demands justification. Some people claim Jessie to be not only the oldest mule in the United States, but the oldest mule living. It is a popular fancy of cowboys, horse tamers and human flies, do not live to a very great age. Unable to be worked to death, they are usually killed, it is claimed, by enraged men who have been crossed by iron-clad hoofs.

Old Shaving Mugs Are Comig Back

Chicago, Oct. 21. —The individual shaving mug, adorned with the owner's name, is staging a comeback. Racks filled with the rows of individual mugs were displayed at the annual convention of the Barbers' Supply Dealers' Association of America. "Scents in hair tonics and talcums used to be more gentled than formerly," Joseph Byrne, secretary of the association, said. "The old-time tonic, advertised a fresh hair out to the world as strongly as a winter overcoat just out of camp, has gone out of style." Mr. Byrne has sold more than \$379,000 worth of handline and brilliantine in barber shops during the past year. "Cake eaters" are having their eyebrows plucked, after the fashion of the flapper, it was said, and the latest style barber chairs are equipped with magazine racks and a place for a powder bowl and puff.

Red Cross Roll Call Heard World Around

The Annual Roll Call of the American Red Cross for registration of the membership for 1923 will begin on Armistice Day, November 11, and close on Thanksgiving Day, November 30. The ground work for this stupendous task of re-enrolling the membership throughout the world has been laid in a plan for the first complete and comprehensive system of registration of the Red Cross membership in all its 3,300 active chapters at home and abroad. An important feature of the round-the-world Roll Call campaign will be a universal effort to re-enlist the service of war-time Red Cross workers in the peace program by their participation in the Roll Call. In this way the vast army of volunteers will once more affiliate with the work of the Red Cross in its manifold phases. Co-operation also has been assured by Government and private maritime interests in a deep-sea Roll Call that is designed to reach every member or potential member in every part of the world who may be on voyage or temporarily in any port. Thousands of chapters will adopt the home canvas plan of enrollment which originated in Pittsburgh, where last year it resulted in a membership increase of 50 per cent. All records in this year's campaign will be kept on standard size cards to be filed by each chapter for future use.

El Universal Staff Strikes For Editor

Nogales, Ariz., Oct. 21. (United Press)—The staff of "El Universal," leading newspaper of Mexico City has gone on a strike because the editor-in-chief has been discharged, according to a dispatch received here. The chief editor and manager of the paper, Palatinos Palatinos is believed to have dismissed the editor, Jose Izarabal, for accepting the post of secretary of the Press Association of Mexico, recently organized, as following Izarabal's refusal to withdraw from the office he was summarily dismissed. Editors, reporters, business employees, linotype operators, pressroom and composing room workers united in a demand that Izarabal be reinstated or he paid three months salary, as provided by Mexico's labor law in the case a worker is discharged through no fault of his own. The entire force walked out with Palatinos refusing the demand, according to reports.
