

LINE WEAK SPOT OF SYRACUSE GRID TEAM

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 21.—Coach John F. ("Chick") Meehan of Syracuse has had a chance to verify what he and his assistants realized was true after the first two weeks or early practice—namely, that the Orange line is the weak spot in this year's team and that a large amount of work must be done to develop forwards. If there is to be the usual strong Syracuse line, there is no disputing the fact that the material is below the average, and if Coach Meehan is successful in developing a strong line capable of holding Penn State at the Polo Grounds, or the Panthers, Nebraska or Colgate at home, he will have accomplished a big task—in fact the biggest of his short but brilliant coaching career.

To add to his troubles, Reinhardt, one of his most promising guards, broke his collar bone and will be out of the game for several weeks. Haysinger, the end, pulled a tendon and is on crutches, thereby removing another very promising guard. For the Akron boy was coming fast in his new position. Shamin, the husky forward who never saw a football game until he reported for the Orange team last year, is another possibility for guard who is "hors de combat," being on the bench with a broken hand.

Vincent and Van Blarcom received the assignment for the Hobart game and neither looked very good in his position. Van Blarcom, the old Commercial High school boy, should be good this year, but he has not shown anything like real class so far. He really is the only guard material that can be called experienced. Late in the game Jappe, another New York boy was substituted for Vincent but he showed little to cause any outbursts of enthusiasm.

**Veterans at Tackle**  
At tackle, Meehan used the veteran "Dutch" Heers and Waldorf. Heers shared with Captain Culver at center whatever honors there were in line play in Saturday's game. Waldorf looked like a find late in the season, but he came out at camp this year, but he seems to have slumped since the squad came to Archibald Stadium. There is a well founded belief, however, that with a little more experience Waldorf will be a very capable tackle.

Whatever disappointment was felt from the performance of the line was not repented from the showing of the backs. The Syracuse backfield men are about the classiest bunch that can be found on any gridiron this fall. They combine line plunging and flashy end running and offensive power with a fine defensive strength which is all that can be desired. Anderson is better than ever and in 1921 was one of the best line backers and defensive backs of the year. McBride, a sophomore hailing from Pennsylvania, is another back of this type, who is going to be a great player this year.

**Simmons A Star**  
Everyone except those on the inside were surprised to see Simmons, the Chicago lad, lead the team at quarterback for the first quarter Saturday. He is believed to be the first real quarterback Syracuse has had since "Chick" Meehan was calling signals for the varsity. Furzanne, the Brooklyn flash, the nemesis of Dartmouth for the past two seasons, looks good again and both he and Anderson have pleased the coaches at halfback and calling the plays this season.

There is no doubt that both will be used in the backfield when Simmons is strong enough to play in a regular place, for neither of them is at his best when playing quarterback. The speedsters, Kellogg, Zimmerman and Front, could not show to advantage Saturday because the Hobart forwards were sitting through too fast and stopping and runs. Bowman, the sophomore, of whom much is expected this year, did not get into the game Saturday.

Of the ends, Melroe and Rosengrant were the best ones to show on the field on Saturday. Rosengrant, the old Master Park star, reminds the Orange followers of Joe Kaller, the All-American end of 1912, and they expect him to be the best flank man on the squad this year. If injuries do not keep him off again, as they did in 1921.

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ments. The rat reacts to the poison. It is extremely weak, but it is interesting to note that one of them has ever died and that it has been possible to save thousands of human lives as a result of the experiments.

**Work on Rabies**  
Again the public health service is doing heroic work for the suppression of rabies, or mad dog bite. All of the so-called Pasteur treatment in the country originated here.

The rabbit that tried to fight the bulldog in the vicious rabid bite are inoculated with rabies and in their individual cages they progress to the stage of paralysis and die. When they do, the spinal cord is removed and from this the serum is prepared.

These hairless animals, experts say, do not bear out the theory that an enraged animal will attack anything. During the whole period when they are being poisoned and when the disease develops they are handled daily.

There are reasons in this laboratory of the government who handle mice quite as cautiously as most women look to their hair nets.

They take them out of jars with their hands open up a space somewhere near the fifth rib and gently shove in a needle. It happens to be a hypodermic, laden with pneumonia serum. The mice have been previously given pneumonia and the shot is to see whether they recover. Most usually they do. The government contends that its "medicines" for this particular disease is most effective.

Aside from all of this the public health service is conducting wide experiments in the nutritive value of foods. Countless monkeys and pigeons are used. As one or the other grows pale the diet is increased or diminished. In this way the diet for all of the government hospital is regulated.

This does not take into account that all of the water one drinks, particularly water on trains and steamships, is tested and must come up to specification.

Just as far as it is humanly possible, Dr. Cumming says, the health of the United States is being safeguarded.

Pipe Smoking Proved to Be 500 Years Old

Washington, Oct. 21.—Evidence that tobacco pipe smoking by Indians dates back more than 500 years is announced by the Smithsonian Institution.

Dr. J. Walter Fawkes, chief of the bureau of American ethnology of the Smithsonian has reported the unexpected unearthing of a ruin in the West Verde National Park, Colorado, which he has named the "pipe shrine house."

A large number of clay pipes were found scattered about in a circular shrine just as they had been thrown there by cliff dwellers during ceremonial rites five centuries ago.

In a burial ground near by was found a perfect skeleton over 500 years old.
