Rome, Oct. 21. (By mail to United Press.)—Will a little child lead Pope Pius XI from his voluntary prison in the Vatican? Will children accomplish that which diplomats and governments have failed to do since the Papal State lost its temporal power in 1870?

These are questions which are being asked in Vatican circles with growing insistence. And if this breaking down of a historic tradition occurs, America will be the cause.

The present Pope's broad humanitarianism and his fondness for children, especially, are as well known as his erudition and his understanding of world affairs.

When Edward D. Hearn came to Rome recently as head of the Knights of Columbus in the Eternal City, His Holiness, Pope Pius XI, questioned him at length about practical humanitarian work.
