"If the legislation fails, then will come the supreme humiliation, the admission that the United States—our America—once eminent among the maritime nations of the world—is incapable of asserting itself in the peace triumphs on the seas of the world."

"The third is obstructive—involving the sacrifice of our ships abroad to the measure of our aspirations and the confession of our impotence to the world in general and our humiliation before the nations of the world in particular."
